DRIVER DRAWS FINE AND JAIL TERM AT WAPAK

(Lima News Bureau) WAPAKONETA, Oct. 29—Two persons pleaded guilty to charges of driving while under the influence of alcohol when arraigned in common pleas court Monday before Judge W. T. Copeland. Both were involved in week-end traffic mishaps.

Mark Shockman of Dayton was fined \$100 and costs, his driver's license suspended for one year and sentenced to 90-days in the county jail here after he admitted having been arrested for the same offense on four different occasions in Dayton. He was involved in an accident near Minster late Sunday evening. No one was injured.

Guy Rasener of St. Marys received a 100 fine and a 30 day jail sentence. He was arrested Saturday by St. Marys police after driving into an alley and hitting a private garage, moving it more than three feet from its foundation.

Rasener was released after making arrangements to pay the fine, costs and damage to the building. Shockman, meanwhile, expects to complete arrangements to pay his fine after the 90-day jail sentence has been served.

TWO POLITICAL PARTIES PLAN RALLY SERIES

(Lima News Bureau) WAPAKONETA, Oct. 29—A number of rallies have been scheduled for both major political parties for an elaborate series during the coming week.

George Hassenler, Republican chairman, said Elton Kila will speak at New Hampshire Tuesday night with James N. Blissell, of Lima. Eugene Lippincott, Lima attorney, will address a Republican gathering at Buckland on Wednesday evening, and D. W. Whipper, former secretary of the state industrial commission, will be the speaker at a St. Marys rally.

The Democrats will sponsor their first meeting of the week Tuesday evening at Waynesfield with Judson Harmon of Mt. Victory as the main speaker.

The biggest Democratic meeting of the week will be staged Friday night at Minster in the form of an old time rally, including real flares and a band. Wendell Killian, chairman of the party's executive committee, announced.

Congressman Joseph Hendrick of Florida, and Edward Inckmeyer of Toledo, will be the speakers. A free dance will follow. The parade will disband at Eagles park, north of Minster, where the ceremonies will be staged.
