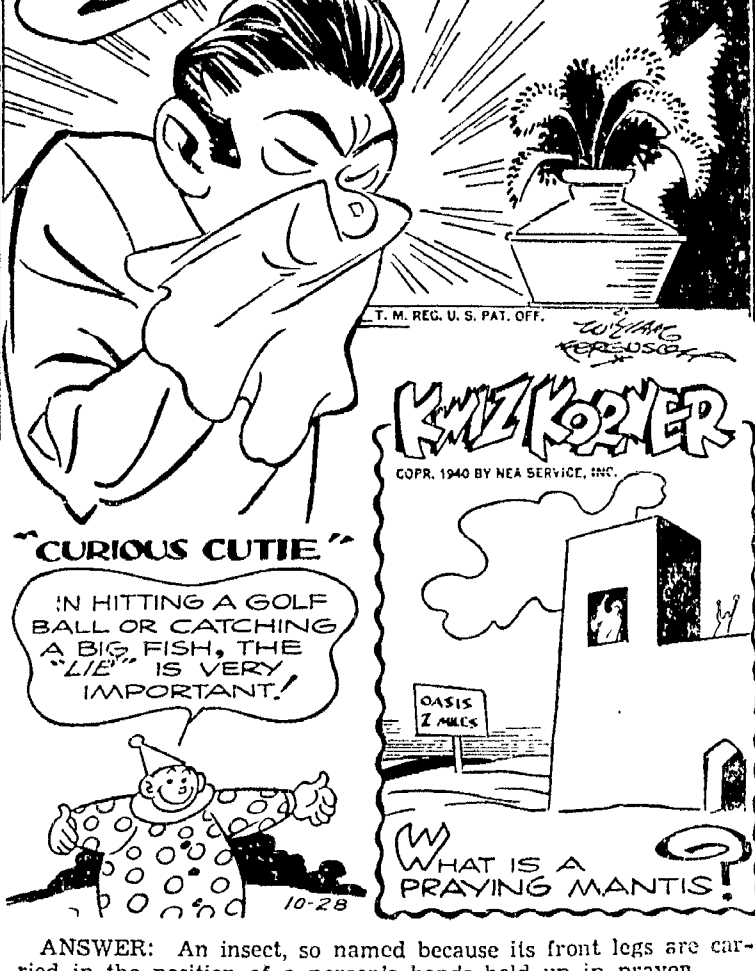

Two New Hits Scheduled On Bill At The State Theatre

"One Million B. C." And "Beyond Tomorrow" Are Attractions; New Type College Film Booked For Quilna Patrons

Time is the principal element in the two new State films, "One Million B. C." and "Beyond Tomorrow." Victor Mature, Carole Landis and Lon Cheney, Jr., are the stars of the prehistoric film which tells of fights between cave and rock people and the huge monsters which roamed their land. Richard Carlson, Charles Winninger, C. Aubrey Smith, Jean Parker and Harry Carey are featured in the other production.

A new type of college life, more realistic and less fantastic, is portrayed in the Quilna film, "Yesterday's Heroes," the story of an All American football star who thought his glory would last forever. "Sing, Dance, Plenty Hot," a musical comedy starring Ruth Terry and Johnny Downs is the co-feature.

Brian Donlevy is starred in "The Great McGinty," at the Sigma, a story of a man who rose from obscurity to political heights, who rose from rags to riches and who found ultimately that happiness wasn't measured in terms of power or dollars. The co-feature, "Money and the Woman" stars Jeffrey Lynn and Brenda Marshall.

Melvin Douglas and Loretta Young are the stars of the Lyric offering, "He Stayed For Breakfast," a clever comedy of a politically-minded waiter who worked for the day when his party would overthrow all and gain power. "Disputed Passage" a stirring story of the sea, is the co-feature.

The Ohio theatre offers "Knute Rockne—All American," a film version of the life of the famous coach. Pat O'Brien is starred in the role of Knute Rockne, with Katharine Aldridge and Russell Gleason.

The veteran coach from College of the Pacific, whose original football shift was adapted by Rockne into "The Notre Dame shift," and one of whose prize pupils, Jesse C. Harper, became Rockne's original football mentor at Notre Dame, told O'Brien and Bacon that they were doing "a remarkable work."

The famous visitor had been Knute Rockne's lifelong friend, having been associated with the Notre Dame idol on the Football Rules Committee, the National Association of Football Coaches.

"Pat O'Brien looks and speaks so much like 'Rock' that I could not believe the evidences of my own senses when I saw him in his makeup for this motion picture," Stagg commented as he watched the felicitous Rockne guide a

DRAFTEES WILL KEEP JOBS, SAYS UTILITY HEAD (Lima News Bureau) FINDLAY, Oct. 30—Francis K. Godwin, manager of the western division of the Central Ohio Light & Power Co., which includes Findlay, Wapakoneta, St. Marys, North Baltimore and adjacent areas, today announced the firm's policy in connection with employees who are conscripted.

The firm will guarantee that jobs of all draftees be held open for one full year or more and that they will hire others only on a temporary basis. In addition, all conscripted employees will receive a bonus of two weeks' pay when they are inducted under the act.

If the employe has no dependents, the company will accrue 20 per cent of his basic salary at the current rate for one year from the time he is inducted into the service, and to employes with dependents, the firm will pay 20 per cent of his salary in monthly installments during the period of his designated dependents.

In addition, the group life insurance and endowment insurances will be maintained for the employe at the expense of the company, Godwin stated.

STORIES IN STAMPS



Europe's Stamp Future Is Philatelic Puzzle

HITLER is making almost as great a jumble of European stamps as he is the map of Europe. The Third Republic of France ended philatelicly with the semi-postal issue above, one of two designs with surtax for the Red Cross. A new issue, picturing Premier Marshal Petain has been announced.

The conquered nations of the west—Holland, Belgium, Denmark, Norway—have continued to use their own stamps. Belgium lost Eupen and Malmedy, and Germany released two pictorials proclaiming the return of former German possessions. German issues are also in use in Alsace and Lorraine.

Hungary and Rumania fought a "war of stamps" over Transylvania, and Hungary has already issued a single item heralding return of the province. Rumania also has a flood of King Carol II issues on hand that must be replaced.

Practically forgotten is the Balkan Entente, honored this year by four-sets of the signatories of the pact. The promised, but never issued, Anglo-French stamp is a thing of the past.

War plays havoc with stamp albums, too.
