# CLASSIFIED TAX BRINGS \$40,000

### Putnam Auditor Makes Distribution Of Last-Half Payments

(Lima News Bureau)  
OTTAWA, Nov. 20—Putnam and its subdivisions received a total of \$40,720.46 from the two collections of tangible and intangible personal property taxes, it was learned today by county officials.  
The distribution of \$11,577.44 obtained in the second-half collection has just been made. Together with \$29,143.02 which was distributed after the first-half collection, makes the total for the year.  
This second-half distribution gives the county \$2,157.89. The schools receive \$5,010.75, the townships \$1,037.36 and the corporations \$3,220.44. The total in this collection is made up of \$10,425.85 in tangible property taxes and \$1,151.59 in intangible receipts.  
The amounts distributed to the various subdivisions besides the county are:

# Swiss Provide Federal Work; Farmers Growl

### BERN, Switzerland, Nov. 20—(AP)—Swiss peasants, overburdened with work due to compulsory military service and consequent shortage of farm hands, are grumbling at government work-creating projects for the unemployed.

They say that building tunnels and highways is too expensive.  
"Send the workers to us," said peasant organizations, "we'll give them plenty to do."  
Workers, however, prefer government projects and they have good reasons.  
One such project is the building of a mountain road thru the Nesselthal valley in the Bernese Alps, which employs mainly older men.  
Work on this road has been in progress for two years and there's still a lot to be done. The absence of steamshovels is painfully noticeable. Gangs of men pick at huge mountain sides with pick and shovel and the road has lots of bridges and tunnels.  
On government projects the day is only 10 hours long six days a week, but working on the farm is a 13 to 14 hour job with plenty of chores on Sunday. The pay envelope on government projects is fatter than on the farm.  
Young unemployed Swiss workers, aged 18 to 28, can join the government labor service for work in fields, mountains and forests, draining swamps, repairing mountain trails, reforesting and lumbering. They work
