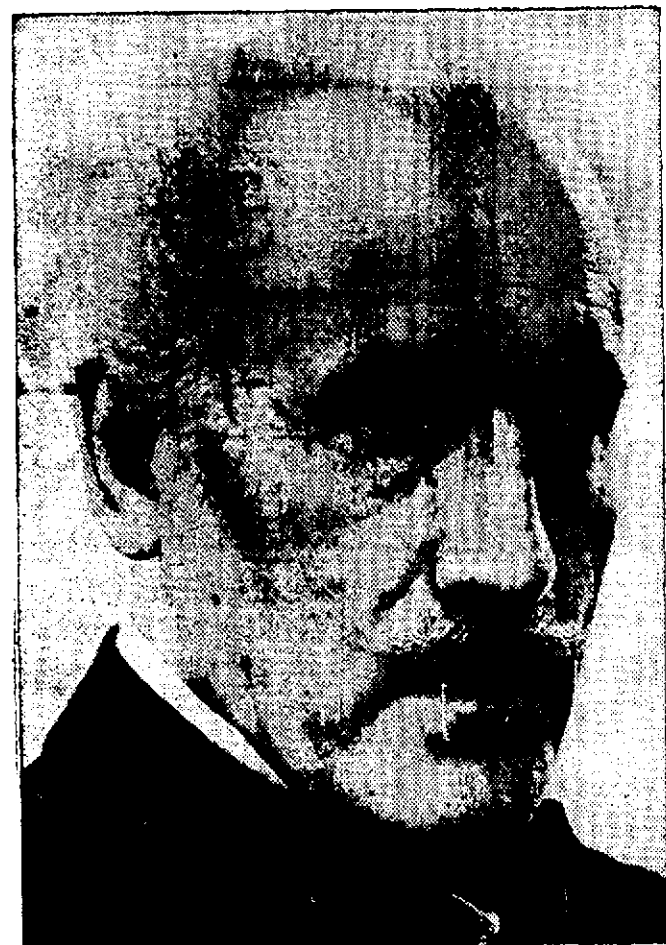

Stitch Lauds Jesuit Accomplishments at Marquette Ceremony

MILWAUKEE (U.P.)—Arch-
 bishop Samuel A. Stritch, Chi-
 cago, outlined achievements of
 the Jesuits at a solemn high mass
 in Gesu Catholic church here
 Thursday, marking Marquette
 university's first formal celebra-
 tion of the 400th anniversary of
 the founding of the Jesuit order.
 The archbishop said the Jesuits
 operated 41 hospitals, 10 lepro-
 colonies, 104 orphanages, 14 uni-
 versities, 47 colleges, and 1,678

State Sends First 130 Under Draft

MILWAUKEE (U.P.)—A group
 of 130 youths, representing Wis-
 consin's first contingent of enrollees
 under the selective service act,
 joined the army in a formal cere-
 mony and departed Friday night
 for Ft. Sheridan, Ill., and a year's
 military training.
 Gov. Heil and Col. Walter J.
 Wilde, state selective service di-
 rector, attended the induction into
 the army of 68 men from Milwau-
 kee county and 62 from 13 other
 counties. Brown and Racine coun-
 ties each sent eight men; Sheboy-
 gan and Winnebago, seven each;
 Manitowoc and Waukesha, six;
 Fond du Lac and Kenosha, five;
 and Calumet, Door, Kewaunee,
 Ozaukee, and Washington, two
 each.
 The ceremony at the armory
 here was closed to all but officials
 and newspapermen.
 Brig. Gen. Charles H. Bone-
 steel, Chicago, commander of the
 sixth corps army area, and
 Maj. Taylor W. Foreman, Chi-
 cago, sixth corps induction
 officer, presided.
 Most of the recruits volunteered
 in order to get their year's service
 out of the way so that they can re-
 sume their work of education.
 At Ft. Sheridan, equipment will
 be assigned, aptitudes determined,
 and the recruits appointed to train-
 ing stations.

Packers Will Fly to Detroit for Game

CHICAGO (U.P.)—The Green
 Bay Packers were to leave here
 by plane today for Detroit, where
 Sunday they will seek victory over
 the Detroit Lions to retain their
 mathematical chance of repeat-
 ing as champions of the Na-
 tional Professional Football
 League.
 Coach E. L. "Curly" Lambeau
 chose to make the trip by air to
 reach Detroit in time for a late
 afternoon workout. The Lions and
 Packers are tied for second place
 in Western division standings of
 the league.
 If Green Bay whips Detroit and
 Cleveland in its remaining games,
 and the league-leading Chicago
 Bears lose either to the Chicago
 Cardinals or the Cleveland Rams,
 the Packers will move into first
 place.

BEWARE OF CROSS-RUFF
 WHEN THE two defenders
 have bid different suits, there is
 grave danger of a cross-ruff if
 you play the hand in a suit con-
 tract, especially a slam. It is well
 to think about trying No Trumps
 instead of your best suit in such a
 situation, as nobody has yet been
 known to ruff a trick in that de-
 claration.

Birmingham Catches It Again

LONDON (U.P.)—German air
 raiders made a savage, all-night
 raid on a city in the western mid-
 lands, dropping high explosive
 bombs on churches, hotels, con-
 vents, schools, municipal build-
 ings, stores, and homes.
 Nazi informants said the
 attack was on Birmingham,
 Great British steel and munitions
 center, a city of 1,000,000
 persons. They said the
 "entire city quarters as well
 as factory areas were destroyed
 and gutted;" that fires could be
 seen on the French coast, 175
 miles away, and that dive bomb-
 ing tactics were used on Birmingham
 for the first time.
 The attack lasted from 7 p. m.
 Friday until nearly 6 a. m. today.
 The residential section suffered
 fearful damage. Fire fighters and
 civil defense workers toiled un-
 ceasingly throughout the night,
 even while the raid was at its
 height.

 in it. North had not ruffed it. South
 had not supported it and West
 himself had only one card, so East
 must have something worthwhile
 in spades. He therefore led the
 singleton to East's A and the lat-
 ter returned the spade 9, a high
 card to indicate he wanted a lead
 of the higher ranking of the two
 side suits.
 When West ruffed that second
 trick, he followed instructions
 with a lead of the heart 6, East
 trumping and thus setting the
 contract. No. It could have been
 set still on more trick if West
 had been clairvoyant enough to
 open a heart.
 South called it hard luck when
 he was beaten by the cross-ruff,
 but the other called it bad bridge,
 because he should not have played
 the hand at his suit, following
 some very unskilled bidding on
 his own part.

GOP Edmands Wins Racine Post in Recount
