Baton MacLane, Joseph Sawyer and Horace MacLachlan promote all the villainy of the piece, as the Wildnick brothers, long the scourge of Toledo, until Gene and his boys clean them out, once and for all.

Clark Gable and Joan Crawford in "Strange Cargo" and Eddie Cantor in "40 Little Mothers" are the two hits offered Monday at the Majestic.

There would seem to be a decided bull market in orchids and a consequent boom in the matter of stage-door johns in the vicinity wherever George White's rollicking "Scandals" is currently holding forth. The production will open in Lima Tuesday at the Ohio theatre.

In stating a well known fact, it would perhaps be advisable to detail the cause of this carnival spirit. The answer is that Maestro White, ever one to pay strict attention to the selection of his dancing beauties as he does in arranging for his stars, always attracts the town's swains to his very stage door. The orchid boom is the inevitable result of this desire of the men-about-town to make an impression on the gorgeous femininity who decorate the "Scandals" chorus.

Beauty has ever been one of White's most marketable stage products. In an endeavor to corral the most glamorous of feminine pulchritude, he begins his beauty search six weeks in advance of the rehearsal call. Thus the press department stories are sent out to hundreds of newspapers throughout the land that George White is about to launch another "Scandals" and believe it or not, neither blondes and brunettes, who think they can pass muster, no matter how great the distance from Times Square, start sending in their photographs in the hope of being chosen.

This procedure, of course, is not at all satisfactory for photographers who can be so deceptive. Besides, figure and face must be equally attractive. A large number of girls, however, make the trip to New York for the chorus girl auditions with, naturally, varying degrees of success.

The ensemble of the newest "Scandals" was selected at nine auditions held on the stage of the Alvin theatre over a period of two weeks. Upwards of 3,000 girls answered the various calls before the 50 beauties now in the show were selected. These come from virtually half the states of the union.

So great has been the popular demand for westerns and more westerns that the studios which guided and sponsored the destinies of Gene Autry ever since he was a fledgling cowboy, now presents the crowning western hero in an outsize feature production of "epic" proportions. "Melody Ranch," which is now at the Quilna theatre, has been enthusiastically received by its local premiere audience, and it should prove definitely that westerns are ready for the "Big Time." Ann Miller, the decorative and tersely dextrous young lady who made such an outstanding hit in "The Hit Parade of 1941," scores again as Gene's leading lady. She has made such rapid strides since her outstanding performance of "Essie" in "You Can't Take It With You," that before long she will undoubtedly be rated one of the top feminine stars in the industry.
