

Badger Farmer Ignores Machine Age

Charley, Oxen Stick to Old Ways SOUTH WAYNE - Coming from behind in the last quarter with an eight-point rally, Argyle

CHICAGO -(U.P)- The machine age hasn't which will be trained to replace them. caught up with C. E. "Old Charley" Ward.

Tractors have displaced horses on many American farms, but on Ward's 640-acre Adams county, Wisconsin, farm teams of oxen still pull the plows. It's been that way for years because Charley is "a fool for luck" and prefers to rely on old fashioned methods.

Ward brought his team of seven-year-old oxen, a hulking pair of snow white Holsteins, to the 41st International Livestock exposition to pull a covered wagon around the arena where each night the world's best horses are on display and compete for riding and hauling honors, where buzzing tractors haul the harrow that smooths the dirt-floored ring. He has sold the team to the Chicago Union stock yards, but there are two more pairs back on the Grand Marsh, Wis., farm

Charley was on his way to visit his sister in South Wayne, 16-14, here Tues-South Dakota when he first saw Tom and Jerry day night. Argyle won, 12-10, on on the farm of Harry Mosely near Sparta, Wisfour years ago. He made a deal — a sharp deal Argyle led, 8-5, at halftime but because Charley is Scotch-English and favors the South Wayne forged into a 12-8 Scotch - and traded a pair of two-year-old short-

horns and \$130 for the oxen.
"They're worth every cent of it," said Ward.

"They're better than horses any day." Ward uses them for all the work draft horses would do on the homestead farm where he has lived his 74 years. They do the plowing, fertilizing, and cultivating and Ward reaps the harvests of alfalfa and corn. He also raises dairy cattle and hogs, but mostly he is proud of his oxen.

"Treat 'em well and feed 'em good and you can break a team in three days," he said.
