

New Kay Kyser Picture To Open At The Ohio Friday

"You'll Find Out" Is Title Of Laugh-Packed Thriller; "Scandals" On Stage For Last Times On Thursday

A vicious plot to do away with a beautiful young lady because her father's fortune and an eerie castle is the theme of "You'll Find Out," starting Friday at the Ohio. It is the new starring vehicle for Kay Kyser, his band and the College of Musical Knowledge. Peter Lorre, Boris Karloff and Bela Lugosi, horror trio, and Dennis O'Keefe, Helen Parrish and Alma Kruger lend their dramatic talents to the film. Thursday marks the final day of "George White's Scandals" currently on the Ohio stage featuring Ben Blue.

Quilna preview audiences will be treated to a double feature of "Angels Over Broadway" starring Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., Rita Hayworth, Thomas Mitchell, and "Five Little Peppers in Trouble" starring Edith Fellows. For the last times at the preview will be "Melody Ranch," with Gene Autry, Ann Miller and Jimmy Durante, and "Who Killed Aunt Maggie," murder mystery. Richard Dix rides again in the adventure-romance, "Cherokee Strip," as a U. S. marshal maintaining order in a town on the border of the last great rush. In the film at the Sigma theatre, Edward G. Robinson is starred in the co-feature, "A Dispatch From Reuters," as the man who founded the first world-wide telegraphic news service and was the forerunner of the modern method of gathering world-wide news.

Don Ameche and Betty Grable are the stars of the Lyric feature, "Down Argentine Way," musical extravaganza of romance and tunes in the South American country. Rhythmic, gay and lighthearted is the screen story which is shown with "The Man I Married," dramatic and timely episode starring Joan Bennett, Francis Lederer, Lloyd Nolan and Anna Sten. Saga of the West is the State film, "Wyoming," with Wallace Beery starred as the westerner of evil practices who wins the admiration of a boy and becomes protector of the boy and avenger of his father. Leo Carillo and Ann Rutherford are in the cast. The co-feature, "Private Affairs," offers Nancy Kelly and Robert Cummings in a comedy. Spencer Tracy and Hedy Lamarr are the stars of the Majestic drama, "I Take This Woman," the romance of a serious medic and his socialite wife. Also showing is "Hi, Yo, Silver."

Kay Kyser, the Of Professor, surrounds himself with three of the screen's foremost boyemen and a big cast of film and radio talent in supplying the novelty entertainment of his new picture "You'll Find Out," starting Friday at the Ohio.

In this musical mystery melodrama Peter Lorre, Boris Karloff and Bela Lugosi supply the menace that upsets the romance of Helen Parrish and Dennis O'Keefe and terrorizes Alma Kruger and Kyser's entire band particularly by Ginny Simms, Harry Babbitt, Ish Kabibble and Sully Mason.

Between broadcasts of the College of Musical Knowledge in a radio studio, Kay Kyser and his band fill an engagement to entertain at a big week-end birthday party in an old mansion in a deserted location. Seldom did gaiety have a more eerie setting than the fantastic edifice built by a now dead archaeologist and occupied by his spiritualistically inclined sister and his pretty young daughter.

Kyser and his pals are affected by the gloomy atmosphere and by the grim personalities of Salliano a fake medium, and of Judge Mainwaring, the family lawyer. They are even more affected when they learn that several mysterious attempts have been made on the life of the daughter. One of these attempts nearly kills Ginny Simms.

How the three Bad Humor Men endeavor again and again to get rid of the girl, how Kyser struggles across the secrets of Salliano's mediumistic tricks, and how the band leader manages to save the whole party from annihilation after a series of fantastic adventures with "black magic," lead to a happy conclusion for the romance, and a musical climax with Kay Kyser and his band back before the radio microphone.

To the Quilna theatre screen on Friday comes a thrilling tender, all too-human dramatic narrative, "Angels Over Broadway." The unqualified applause which has greeted "Angels Over Broadway" is a tribute. According to advance report "Angels Over Broadway" outshines in intrinsic narrative merit even other screenplays, it is packed with more drama, more honest character delineation and more understanding
