Cleveland Woman Gets 300, 6th in WIBC History

CLEVELAND—(U.P.)—Miss Amelia Rankel, 31-year-old Cleveland kagler, Friday rolled her way into bowling's hall of fame by making a perfect 300 score.

This was the first time the feat had been accomplished in women's league competition here and the sixth perfect score in the 24-year history of the Women's International Bowling Congress.

Miss Rankel, who is in her fourth year of bowling, had been a 138 average bowler before Friday night. Her best previous score was 219.

Greenberg, York Batted Detroit to League Title

By GEORGE KIRKSEY NEW YORK—(U.P.)—The answer to why the Detroit Tigers won the American League pennant is contained in the first two lines of the official runs-batted in records released today. They read:

Player G BB RBI SO GDP
Greenberg 148 93 150 75 13
York 155 89 134 88 12

Greenberg and York drove in a total of 284 runs, more than any other two players in the league. Greenberg led with 150 RBI, and York was second with 134. Greenberg walked 93 times, struck out 75 times and grounded into 15 infield double plays. York drew 89 passes, fanned 88 times and hit only 12 infield double plays.

Although the Tigers finished fourth in pitching and sixth in fielding, Greenberg and York supplied the power which catapulted Detroit to the championship. The shift of Greenberg from first base to the outfield, enabling the Tigers to play York at the initial sack, thus turned out to be the decisive move of the pennant campaign.

Joe DiMaggio, Yankee thumper, finished third with 13 runs batted in, followed by Jimmy Foss, Red Sox veteran, with 119. It was the 12th consecutive year that Foss had driven in 100 or more runs. Ted Williams, temperamental Red Sox star who set the 1939 pace with 145, dropped to fifth last season with 113.

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Seabiscuit's New Money Mark Was Turf Highlight

Following is another of a series of year-end sports reviews.

BY JACK GUENTHER (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK—(U.P.)—The success of Seabiscuit and the failure of Bimelech provided the two big thrills on the turf during 1940 but the welcome news to men within the trade were the records established in purses, attendance, and wagering almost everywhere in the nation.

There were notable increases on all sides. For owners, trainers, jockeys and track proprietors, the year was the most successful of all time.

There were more horses and more money than ever before. Only the thoroughbreds themselves failed to keep pace. The average appeared a trifle higher, but there was an almost complete absence of dominant performers.

Seabiscuit was the best. After two heart-stopping defeats in nose finishes, C. S. Howard's game little east-out gave his name to the ages with a memorable victory in the \$100,000 Santa Anita Handicap that enabled him to amass the greatest sum won by any horse—the unprecedented figure of \$437,730.

The Biscuit did it the hard way, too. He came back from a serious breakdown and a season in stud to win two of his four races. He carried 130 pounds in the Santa Anita and was clocked in 2:01 1-5, third fastest mile and a quarter in U. S. history.

He carried 124 in the San Antonio and was caught in 1:42 2-5, just two-fifths off the world record for a mile and 1-16 and the fastest time in four years. He quit the turf forever in March after only three months of action yet placed third among the year's winners with \$96,850.

Bimelech started the season as the greatest two-year-old of all time and as Ed Bradley's hope for a fifth Kentucky Derby triumph. He went to Louisville as the short-priced future book favorite of the Churchill Downs, came Gallah-
