Doctor Reports New Treatment for Sex Criminals

CHICAGO—(U.P.)—Effective treatment of a sexual criminal with stilbestrol, recently developed synthetic female sex hormone, was reported by a Philadelphia physician Wednesday night in the Journal of the American Medical Assn.

Dr. Charles William Dunn said that by administering stilbestrol over a period of 96 days to a 27-year-old prison inmate, he was able to obtain a marked diminution of the man's excessive desires.

In an introduction to his report, Dunn said he presented his report of the case as a contribution toward further defining the effect of the substance on humans.

The journal said the AMA's council on pharmacy and chemistry has withheld official recognition of stilbestrol because of untoward symptoms observed in some patients treated with it.

Mintz Fights to Hold Job With Brother

Sam had not been a party in the original action between the truck drivers' union and the cleaning firm, Anna Mae Davis, his attorney, explained, so the action Monday was necessary to permit him to review.

That action also stops his brother Abe from being forced to fire him if he does not become a member.
