Two More City Units Prepare to Heed Army Call

Madison's two remaining national guard units will make final preparations this week for induction into the nation's fast-growing army, Monday, Jan. 13.

Officers and men of Co. H, and of Headquarters and Service Co., both of the 135th medical regiment, have orders to report at 8:30 a. m. to go through induction at the national guard armory, 712 New Market pl.
