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Platteville Armory Work Starts

PLATTEVILLE — A construction gang working in two shifts started work last week on Platteville's new \$85,000 armory which will be the home of Co. M, now stationed at Camp Beaufort, La.

Harry Schneiderwindt, contractor, said that to complete the building by June 30, it will soon be necessary to employ three shifts a day.

Cost of the building will be borne by the federal government and the city. Bonds will be retired by renting the armory to the state for national guard quarters. The city is floating a bond issue of \$30,000 to finance its share.

'40 Potato Crop in Wisconsin Below '39's

A smaller supply of Wisconsin potatoes is available now than a year ago, according to the crop reporting service of the Wisconsin and United States departments of agriculture.

Stocks of merchantable potatoes throughout the nation's late potato states are larger than last winter, the service added. The Badger state's 1940 potato crop was exceptionally small, about 7,675,000 bushels.

Growers, local dealers and buyers in the United States had 14 per cent larger holdings than a year ago.

Wheat Stocks Reported Higher Than in January, '40

Much larger stocks of wheat are being held by interior mills, elevators, and warehouses than were estimated for the beginning of last year, according to the crop reporting service of the Wisconsin and United States departments of agriculture.

For Wisconsin, estimates show that 140,000 bushels of wheat are being held in interior mills, elevators, and warehouses compared with 98,000 bushels a year ago. Farm stocks of wheat are also much larger than a year ago.

Approximately 165,167,000 bushels of wheat were being held by interior mills, elevators, and warehouses in the United States on Jan. 1 of this year. These stocks exceeded by 39,000,000 bushels, or 31 per cent, the Jan. 1, 1940 stocks.

Other classes holding first sessions this week are a survey of English literature and general economics, both set for Thursday. The class offerings in "liberal education" subjects are being arranged for later announcement.

Enrollments in all subjects are being taken by the extension office of field organization.

Slaughterhouse Rule Held to Cover Fur Farm Killing

A slaughterhouse, no matter how its products are used, according to an opinion of Atty. Gen. John E. Martin in response to a request by the state board of health.

Wisconsin's slaughterhouse law extends to establishments which slaughter animals used as food for other animals, the opinion reads, thus governing the sanitary aspects of slaughtering on fox or mink farms, and in dog-food establishments. Under the statutes, the state board of health since 1914 has had sanitation control over slaughterhouses, except those subject to federal inspection and supervision.
