STATE SUMMONS LAST WITNESS

"Money Madness And Jealousy" Alleged In Barrel Slaying

LISBON, Feb. 7 — (AP) — The last of 30 state witnesses was called to the stand today as Prosecutor Frank W. Springer attempted to show a double motive of "money madness and jealousy" in the barrel slaying of Mrs. Julia Wall, 46, a bride of four days.

Frank Cascio, 65-year-old produce dealer, is accused of suffocating Mrs. Wall, his former housekeeper, in his East Liverpool apartment and then stuffing her body into a potato barrel.

Charles Harris testified Cascio told him a day before the Oct. 28 slaying that "Julia had double-crossed me and I feel like killing her."

Mrs. Mavis Johnson, sister of the victim, told Cascio's frequent trips to her home in efforts to arrange a meeting with Mrs. Wall.

The defendant attempted to obstruct information about Mrs. Wall's bank account, James Reaney, employee of an East Liverpool bank, testified.

Mrs. Wall married Christopher Wall four days before the killing. Her husband died in a Buffalo, N. Y. hospital last Saturday.

The barrel which held Mrs. Wall's body was barred from evidence today unless it was restored to the state in the condition in which it was found.

A new state, a new top and a piece of new bottom had been obtained for the barrel. Prosecutor Frank W. Springer said he would have the same cooper "undo" his improvements, and then seek again to introduce the barrel.

"It is the kind of barrel a produce dealer uses," he said.
