Touring Tennis Stars Like New Rule on Meets

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla.—(U.P.)—Touring amateur tennis players, near the end of the Florida winter circuit, almost unanimously agreed today that the United States Lawn Tennis Ass'n's recent tightening up of player restrictions was a "good thing."

In their 50th annual meeting in New York City last Saturday, the U. S. L. T. A. junked the familiar "eight weeks" rule, which enabled a player who had exceeded his expense limit to continue around the entire circuit by living at private homes and in some cases, as guests of a hotel.

The number of tournaments a player could accept expenses for will be limited to 15 beginning March 2, and the amount of free equipment that can be distributed among players also was curtailed.

Former National Champion Bobby Riggs of Chicago said he was agreeable to anything.

"I do not think limiting the number of tournaments will kill the small tournaments," he said.

Frankie Kovacs of Oakland, Calif., winner of four Florida titles this winter, said:

"Now that all this is in black and white we know just where we stand."

Boston Bruins Tie Detroit Red Wings

DETROIT—(U.P.)—The Boston Bruins stretched their undefeated streak to 18 games Sunday night, by tying the Detroit Red Wings, 2-2, in overtime before a capacity crowd of 12,892 at Olympia Stadium.

The tie gave the Bruins only one more to go to equal the record of consecutive games without a defeat set last year by the New York Rangers.

Two goals scored within five minutes of the third period, kept the Boston streak intact. Badly outplayed in the first two sessions, the Bruins finally shook Jack Crawford loose for a shot after a faceoff that eluded Goalie Johnny Mowers through a maze of players.

Eddie Wiseman scored the other goal on a pass from "Dit" Clapper.

Trustees Named For Legless Albany Girl

MONROE—A committee of three trustees has been appointed by the Green county court to act as financial administrators for Mary Ann Broughton, five-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. O. B. Broughton, Albany, County Judge Marshall Peterson announced.

The committee includes Atty. Randal J. Elmer, Monticello, public administrator of Green county; Edith Olson, Monroe, county nurse; and C. R. Phelps, Albany.

The Broughton's daughter, who had both legs amputated below the knee last spring after suffering from a rare skin ailment, in her legs, was assisted financially by contributions of residents in southern Wisconsin. Her health has improved sufficiently so that she will soon be able to attend the Wisconsin Orthopedic hospital at Madison, Judge Peterson said.

Miss Olson is making arrangements for transporting Mary Ann to and from the hospital.

A petition that the judge appoint this committee was presented to the court by Robert Smiley, Albany, landowner of the Broughtons, and Mrs. Al Dunphy, Albany, both of whom were active in raising funds for the girl.

Judge Peterson said no estimate is available of the funds remaining for the girl's use.

Unknown Wins \$10,000 Stakes

ARCADIA, Calif.—(U.P.)—His orange silks bobbing brightly against a sunless sky, W. G. Simpson's General Manager Saturday pulled easily away from 11 rivals in the stretch for a smashing upset victory in the seventh running of the \$10,000 San Carlos handicap.
