ATLANTA, Ga.— (U.P.) — A machine that may free the South from the grip of King Cotton, and at the same time bring a \$31,000,000 addition to the nation's income, has been perfected by two Georgia Tech scientists. The device is a decorticator

 machine that removes the wood from flax fiber instantaneously. It eliminates the slow, inefficient process of "retting," which involved soaking flax straw in water until the woody portion decomposed and fell away from the fibers. The machine also chops the fibers in uniform lengths which can be spun with machinery now used in cotton mills.

Announcement of the decorticator came after five years of experimentation at Georgia Tech. The experiments were financed by the Tennessee Valley Authority, as the inventors.
