Uncle Ray's Corner

A LITTLE SATURDAY TALK: FIRST AID

Several weeks ago I told about a nine-year-old boy who hurt his ankle on a school playground. Two of his friends carried him into the school, and later I helped to carry him to an automobile, after a doctor had directed that he be brought to his office.

It seemed probable that the injury was no more than a sprain or torn ligament, but care was taken to keep the leg from bearing any weight or stress while the boy was on his way to the doctor's office.

An X-ray picture proved there were two small breaks in the ankle. The doctor placed the ankle in a cast, and the boy was able to walk on crutches a day or two later. I am glad to report that today he is able to walk without either a cast or crutches.

Many a time people have thought that an injury was "only a sprain" when there was really a broken bone. The worst mistake is for a person to put his weight on a leg when there seems real danger that it has been broken.

Often very bad advice. "Try to walk on it," has been given by well-meaning friends to someone who has broken his leg.

If a person feels sharp pain after hurting his leg, it is best to call a doctor to the scene. Moving the patient means danger if the leg has been broken. Unless special care is taken, the broken bone may spread out, cutting through the flesh and skin. When that happens, the injury becomes far more serious.

If a person with a broken leg or arm must be moved, someone with knowledge of "first aid" should put on a splint. A splint can be made by tying a straight piece of wood or other hard material to the broken leg or arm, with bandages on both sides of the injury.

Even more serious is an injury to the back or to the neck. Present-day doctors often meet success in treating broken backs and necks; but such success becomes almost, if not quite, impossible when the injured person is moved by those who do not have expert knowledge of how to handle him.

That is why it may be agreed mistake to "rush him to the hospital." It is better for a person with a bad injury of his back or neck to lie in the road at the scene of an accident, waiting for an ambulance, than to be moved by those without expert knowledge. Friends can stand by to flag motorists and warn them to turn aside.
