

If so, how does it compare with that of the earth? tions that I would like to ask you. When the moon is closest to the You are the only person I know of earth, how far away is it? Where does a meteor come from? Is a meteor heated by the friction of falling through space?"

All the questions Joseph asks are good ones; and they show he has been thinking about things. The greatest air pressure between the earth and the moon is to be found at sea level on the earth. Air pressure in our atmosphere comes from the weight of air above. The higher we go, the smaller the air pressure. At sea level the air pressure is about 14

and three-fourths pounds.

Yes, there is gravity on the moon. It is not nearly so great as that on the earth. If you can jump three feet high, you could jump over a bungalow by using the same strength on the moon. There is, by the way, no air pressure on the moon. The best




