Jan Struther, who insists she is not Mrs. Miniver, despite the fact that her public constantly tries to make her so, nevertheless has the same personal charm and infectious sense of humor as that possessed by the leading character

in her best seller, "Mrs. Miniver."

AAUW over WIBA you can hear his afternoon, my dear children." Damrosch was born in Breslau, Germany, in 1862. His father, a famous European musician, did much, after coming to America in 1871, to make New York a musical center. He organized and directed the New York Symphony orchestra and the Oratorio
