While there is some nudity in the show, it is tastefully presented in such a manner as to cause no offense. The same is true of the show's comedy material. The "Midnight in Miami" comedians are seasoned performers who long have learned that solid laughs can still be obtained without resorting to so-called blue material. Produced with a view to pleasing the family trade, "Midnight in Miami" boasts of wealth of girl, novelty features, and smash comedy, but it's all presented without giving any member of the household an excuse to blush or become embarrassed.

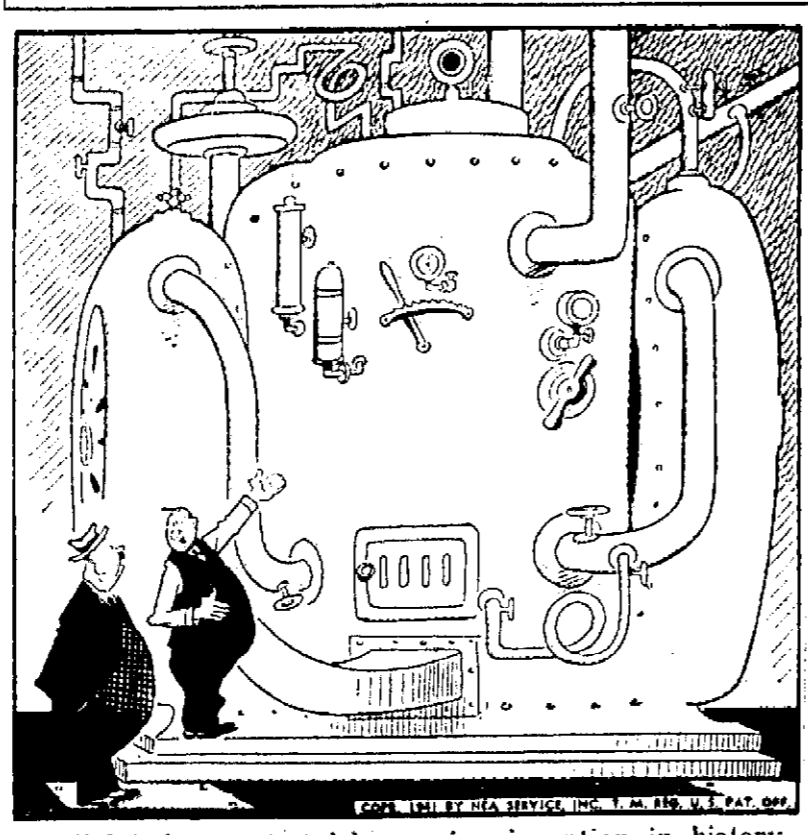
