Based on the number of persons fed by each farm in the United States, the efficiency of American farms has nearly doubled in 60 years, the census bureau reported

In 1940, each farm-averaging 174 acres-produced food for 21.6 people. Ten years earlier each farm supplied 19.5 people. In 1920, the figure was 16.4; in 1910, 14.5;

In 1850, when the first complete farm census was taken, each farm produced food for 16.0 people, but farms averaged 203 acres at that time. The average size of farms had been reduced to 134 in 1880; had increased to 146 in 1900, and, since that time, has ranged be-tween 138 in 1910 and 174 in 1940. In 1850 it required 12.7 acres of farm land to feed one person. Eight acres fed one person in 1940. Belgium's condition is nearly 12 times as intensive - 1.5 persons per arable acre instead of 8 farm


