John Shelton and Virginia Gray star in the co-feature, "Blonde Inspiration." Concluding Tuesday is "Mr. and Mrs. Smith," starring Robert Montgomery and Carole Lombard.

Magnificently acted, directed and filmed with emphasis on breath-taking realism, "Tobacco Road," ready on the Quilna screen, stars a quartet of veteran performers including Charley Grapewin, Marjorie Rameau, Zeffie Tilbury, Ward Bond, William Tracy and Gene Tierney. Grapewin has his greatest role to date as he portrays the noted Georgia farmer, Jester Lester.

At the Ohio theatre an enthralling romance, "Back Street," stars Charles Boyer and Margaret Sullivan, with a supporting cast including Richard Carlson, Frank McHugh, Tom Holt and Frank Jones. Bicycle, hansom cabs, hacks and carriages with automobiles of the vintage of 1898 recall a colorful period to provide the background for one of the season's best romantic films.

"One Crowded Night," currently at the Lyric theatre, is the thrilling and suspenseful story of a man, innocently convicted of a crime, who returns to his wife and child to vindicate himself. How the opportunity presents itself, offers a surprising climax. Co-featured is Lloyd Nolan in "Chatter Pilot."

The Lane Sisters, Priscilla, Rosemary and Lola, and Gale Page, are the stars of the State's story, "Four Mothers," which continues with another episode in the life of the Lomp family. Co-featured is "Highway 17" on Tuesday and Wednesday and "She Married a Cop" and "Hit Parade."

A former musician and orchestra leader, Jenks has had little Hollywood when picture executives noticed his keenly performed as master of ceremonies as he led his orchestra.

He was engaged as a comedian and flashed into fame as the taxi driver in Desma Durbine's "100 Men and a Girl" a few seasons ago.

Jenks has one of the key supporting roles in "Back Street." He is seen as Harry Niles, the dapper young snort who playfully causes a rift between the lovers around whom the plot moves.

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He took a whirl at vaudeville but roller skating was his first love and at the ripe old age of 14 Charley was floor manager of the Pimlico rink in Cincinnati. On the side he learned the intricacies of trapze work.

Then came what Grapewin still considers one of the highlights of his amazing career. With Harry

King and Eddie Silvon he made up the famed Silvon Trio, an act which was rated the fastest and most dangerous aerial act in the world.

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The cast of comedy stars is headed by Reginald Owen, and Donald Meek, who plays a henpecked husband and wacky author respectively. Other top talent includes Albert Dekker, Charles奎尔沃思, Alma Kruger, Rita Quigley, Marion Martin and George Jessel.

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
