State Delays Setting Road Job Pay Scale

The state industrial commission Friday postponed setting of proposed wage rates for state highway construction work during 1941 until May, and appointed a committee to study the possibility of changing a law requiring the commission to meet on the rates 30 days after a highway commission request.

Almost 30 contractors and labor representatives were on hand this morning and they were unanimous in seeking postponement, lung sought.

"The process of wage negotiations between contractors and labor unions is going on about this time," Arthur Olsen, Milwaukee, representing the Wisconsin State Federation of Labor, said. "Some later date for this hearing is necessary to do the job effectively."

Jay A. Hathaway, Madison, of the Wisconsin Council of Carpenters, said, "We are here to protect contractors as well as workmen. This early hearing date penalizes Wisconsin contractors."

Olsen also pointed out that when the bulk of state highway contracts are let before the wage rate determination, the workmen are employed on many jobs all year at the wrong rate.

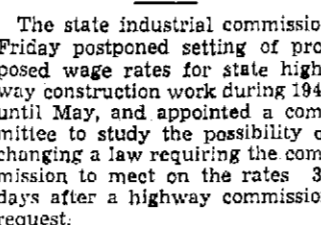
