

# Six Hollywood Stars Found In Two Hits At The State

## "Men Against The Sky" And "Invisible Women" Make Up New Bill; Ohio Has Popular Trio In "Virginia"

Six of Hollywood's best liked stars are seen in the two new pictures, "Men Against The Sky," and "Invisible Women," which open Thursday at the State for a three-day run. The hit revolving around aviation features Richard Dix, Edmund Lowe and Wendy Barrie while the other picture stars Virginia Bruce, John Barrymore and John Howard. "Comrade X" and "Mexican Spiffire Out West" end Wednesday.

Continuing to please Ohio theatre patrons is "Virginia," glorious new technicolor production which is packed with many big name stars. "Free and Easy," laugh-racked story of a pair of society "fortune hunters" has Robert Cummings and Ruth Hussey in the leading roles. Commencing Thursday at the Majestic are "Torture Ship," and "Little Nellie Kelly." "They Shall Have Music," with Joel McCrea and Andrea Leeds, and "House of Secrets," end Wednesday.

"Thrill-a-minute" entertainment is offered in latest mystery hit "Michael Shayne, Private Detective," currently at the Quilna theatre. Elaborate social functions, homes of the rich, the races, a fashionable casino, gorgeously costumed men and women, set the picture in a setting of charm and glamor.

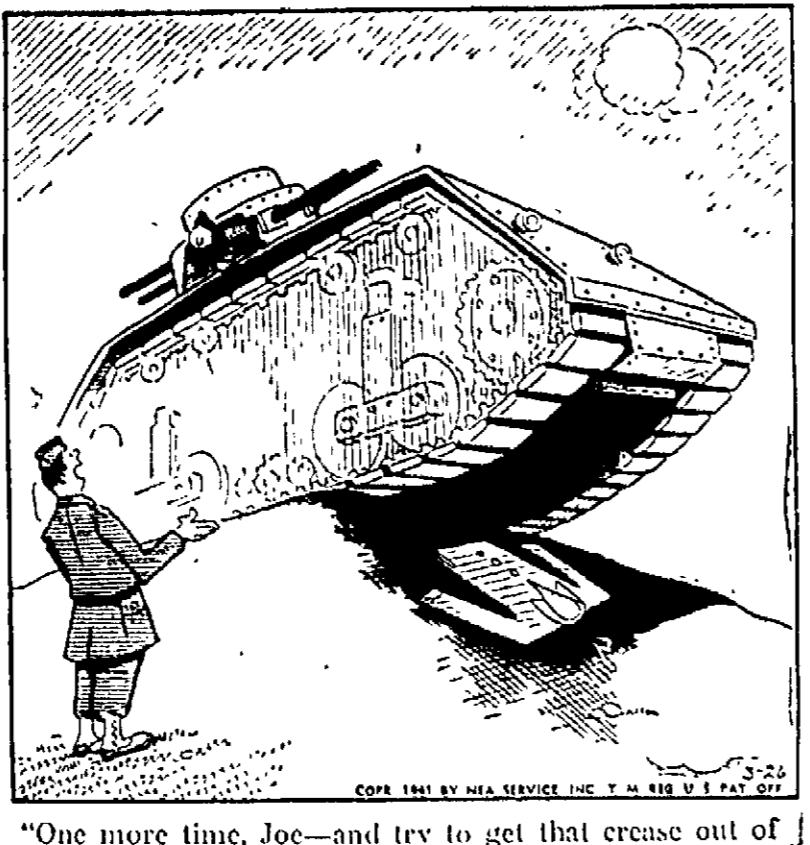
