An increase in state aids to high schools from \$1,385,000 annually to \$2,500,000 was voted down by the assembly Friday upon recommendation of the house education committee. Also killed was a measure which would have required state banks to stay open the same hours on Saturdays as on other days of the week. Preliminary assembly approval

was given a bill appropriating \$34,400 a year to carry out a state-wide citizenship training program under supervision of the state superintendent of public instruction. Two senate-approved proposals

One would have permitted establishment of bank stations within 50 miles of the home office and in adjoining counties of less than 36,000 population. The present law confines stations to a 25 mile radius and to counties of less than 16,000 population. The other measure would have pre-vented appeal to the state superintendent of public instruction from refusal of a city school district to change the boundaries of the district to take in an area outside

the corporate limits of the city. Passed and sent to the senate was a bill authorizing domestic life insurance corporations to invest their funds in authorized municipal bonds of municipalities of 5,-000 population or more, and in loans not exceeding 60 per cent of the value of real property se-
