Senate Passes Every Bill Asked By Heil

By WILLARD R. SMITH (Of the United Press) Every bill carrying out Gov. Heil's recommendations to the 1941 legislature in his two messages and a subsequent expansion of his program has been passed by the senate today.

The biennial budget bill has passed both houses and awaits Heil's signature now. Creation and financing of the home guard became law last week. The rest of his program awaits assembly action.

Whether this is to be a short session of the legislature appears to depend upon the cohesion of the Republican majority in the assembly. Already there are indications that individuals in that group, fearful that adjournment might occur before they can obtain passage of their own pet projects, are delaying the administration program while they try to advance their own bills.

Heil made comparatively few requests of the legislature. His first message asked no new taxes but re-enactment of five existing taxes which otherwise expire June 30; model home guard, anti-sabotage, and explosives control acts and restoration of compulsory military training at the University of Wisconsin. His second message outlined the executive budget now awaiting his signature after its passage earlier than any previous budget in legislative history.

His request for emergency powers to create boards and commissions, made more recently to the Republican steering committee, was met by a bill passed in the senate and sent to the assembly last week.

The only exception is the governor's recommendation that the state highway and conservation commissions be placed upon a budget basis rather than continued operation with revolving funds. Bills to carry out this recommendation have not yet made their appearance in either house.

The governor has endorsed a \$1,900,000 building program for the university, leaving to the legislature the question of whether it can finance the undertaking. Appropriation bills for the various projects involved have been introduced in both houses, and the assembly has one all-inclusive proposal, but none of them has been passed yet in either house.

Two other proposals which Heil left to determination of the legislature under the general heading of departmental reorganization, without any specific recommendation by him, have been introduced. They would transfer the beverage tax division and gasoline tax collection from the treasury to the tax department.

But the bulk of his program outlined to the law makers, the model defense acts and the taxes on cigarettes, dividends, gifts, estate transfers, and a surtax on incomes, and compulsory military training at the university all are pending in the assembly after passage by the senate.
