State Roads Follow Indian, Buffalo Trails

By IVAN CLYDE LAKE In that unnamed Wisconsin of long time past, heavy-footed buffaloes, tramping the primeval wilderness, beat down trails that became courses for many main-traveled highways of our modern

In search of new foraging places, they lumbered through timberlands, over hills, along lakes and rivers, and laid out with sure instinct trails that were shortest and easiest to follow.

It was the American bison that made the first ways without com- came clamorous. pass or theodolite.

First of the two-footed creatures to follow the buffalo trails was the Indian. He made warpaths of them or traveled them en route to hunt for furs Sometimes, however, he ventured on new ways, and his instinct was as sure as that of the buffalo.

With the help of nature, the red man made the original gulde posts that pointed out the directions in which his trails ran. He selected young trees where trails crossed and trained their branches to point

0 0 0 The first road in Wisconsin worthy of remark, was built to expedite military operations between Ft. Howard at Green Bay and Ft. Crawford at Prairie du Chien. Named the Military road it ran along the south bank of Fox river, followed the east shoreline of Lake Winnebago, and then struck out westward across country on a direct line to Portage where Ft. Winnebago stood.

From there it ran southwest-ward to Blue Mounds, following well-trodden Indian trail; thence along the Wisconsin watershed, giving that portion of it the name of Military ridge; then it crossed the Wisconsin about six miles above the river's mouth and ran southwestward until it reached Prairie du Chien.

The Military road, largely constructed through timbered

lands as a track about two rods wide, reduced the distance between Green Bay and Prairie du Chien by nearly one half; over the Fox-Wisconsin waterway the stretch was 400 miles, while over-land it was 230 miles.

But the Military road could not rve as a highway to every point in Wisconsin. With the inrush of miners and farmers, particularly after 1832, the building of roads became necessary. For a time lead was shipped by water to southern markets, but the cry for roads over which it could be transported to Lake Michigan soon be-

4 4 Roads of a kind were built, plank roads for whose use a toll was paid. Sessions of the territorial legislatures were alive with discussions of overland transportation; and corporations sprang up like mushrooms and sent out crews of workers to hew highways through the wilderness. Furthermore, the territory obtained appropriations from congress for highway purposes.

Transportation problems sharp-ened with the inflow of farmers after land offices were opened in Green Bay and Mineral Point in 1834. Long trains of teams daily to the timberland.
