Compared with Racine, having a population figure approximately the same, Madison's total debt then was \$1,064,000 higher than the lake shore city's, the study showed.

Madison's debt total consisted of \$5,199,000 in general long term obligations, payable from any revenues not otherwise obligated; \$150,000 in revenue bonds outstanding, payable exclusively from revenues of specified income-producing properties for which the bonds originally were issued; and \$102,000 covered by special assessments. All obligations were interest bearing.

Comparative figures for local and state government debts borne by each Wisconsin citizen showed a sharp drop between 1932 and 1940. In 1932, each person had \$70.09 in local debts charged against him, 40 cents for state debts, totalling \$70.49. For 1940, the figure had dropped to \$46.91 local debts, but rose to \$1.31 for the state, totalling only \$48.22, the report stated.

The state's total gross debt in 1932 was \$209,347,000 against only S151,328,000 as of June 30, 1940.
