Board Named to Investigate Rail Labor Disputes

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—The White House announced Monday the personnel of a three-man board created by President Roosevelt to investigate labor disputes on the Duluth, Missabe and Iron Range railway, the Chicago, and North Western railways, the Great Northern railway and the Minneapolis, St. Paul and Sault Ste. Marie railways.

The personnel members are Arthur E. Whittemore, Boston attorney; G. Stenleigh Arnold, San Francisco attorney, and William H. Tschappat, Falls Church, Va., retired major general and former chief of army ordinance.

The board was set up by Roosevelt last Friday under provisions of the railway labor act, and must report its findings to him within 30 days. The dispute—in which employees are represented by the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees—threatened to interrupt interstate commerce between Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan and on the Great Lakes.

State Farm Workers Earn More

Wisconsin farm laborers are earning 24 per cent more this year than last, the crop reporting service of the Wisconsin and United States departments of agriculture reported today.

Fewer men are working on farms than in 1940 but the shortage of labor is not yet acute in the state, according to the service. Wages in agriculture are now 29 per cent higher than in the pre-war years from 1910 to 1914.

Farmers frequently comment that some men who were available last year have gone into the army and others have found employment in industrial plants. The service pointed out:

The fact that wages are considerably higher than a year ago indicates that less labor is available and the demand perhaps has increased somewhat as compared with recent years.

Spring planting has been delayed in southern Wisconsin due to wet weather but is running on schedule in the central part of the state and ahead of schedule in northern Wisconsin.
