McQuillan Gets Starks' WPA Job

MILWAUKEE (U.P.) - John R. McQuillan, Antigo, Monday was named manager of the Milwaukee Work Projects Administration district to succeed Sanford P. Starks, who was dismissed last January with two other executives.

The appointment was announced at Madison by Mark Muth, state WPA administrator.

The new director, 56 years old, was to take over his post June 5. He had returned to private business in April, 1940, after serving for seven years as state manager of the Home Owners Loan corp.

Starks was dismissed as the result of a federal investigation into charges that employment on WPA projects in the district was dominated by local 113 of the American Federation of Labor Common Laborers and Hod Carriers union. Also dismissed at the same time were Don Uthus, district director of operations, and F. Joseph Piziali, assistant director of operations and member of local 113.

The three were dismissed as a disciplinary measure without being held culpable of any formal charges of misdealing.

R. C. Karmann, deputy state administrator, has been serving the district as director pending choice of a successor to Starks.

The HOLC made loans totaling \$115,000,000 to 33,000 Wisconsin district home owners during McQuillan's term as state manager of that organization. He organized the original state HOLC office at Madison and branches at Milwaukee, Oshkosh, Eau Claire, Wausau, Racine, and Kenosha. The state office subsequently was moved to Milwaukee.

U.S. Farmers Vote for Wheat Quotas

WASHINGTON (U.P.) - The nation's wheat farmers have voted overwhelmingly in favor of market quota restrictions on the 1941 crop, returns from an agriculture department referendum showed Sunday night.

Balotting in 37 states showed 80.5 per cent of producers favored the proposed restrictions. The vote in all states except Alabama and Arkansas was 394, 929 for quotas and 95,508 against.

Secretary of Agriculture Claude Wickard hailed the outcome as a decisive step by the farmers to meet the challenge of the present emergency.

"By their own decision the farmers have shouldered their responsibility for doing their part to keep the nation strong," he said, "homed in by economic and war blockades, they face a surplus that uncontrolled could well undermine an important part of our economic structure."

"In approving marketing quotas, they agreed upon co-operative action as an answer to that program. In meeting the demands of today's per-paredness program, thousands of farmers are responding with increased production of such commodities as meat, dairy products, and vegetables."

"What farmers, as the vote indicates, recognize that the job before them is not one of providing more wheat but a job of safeguarding and managing well supplies already on hand."

Agricultural Adjustment Administrator R. M. Evans said the result of the balloting would assure wheat farmers a return on their 1941 crop approximately equal to parity.

Under the forthcoming program, Wickard will establish a quota for each farm. Marketings in excess of that quota will be subject to a federal penalty of 15 cents a bushel. For growers who planted within their 1941 AAA acreage allotment the quota will be the total amount of wheat grown. Quotas will not apply to farmers having less than 15 acres in wheat or producing fewer than 200 bushels.
