The guest experts, serving with Dr. John Kieran and Franklin P. Adams, are Walter Duranty and John Gunther, foreign correspondents and authors. It will be Duranty's first trip to the board of experts' table, and Gunther's ninth.

"I Write As I Please," Duranty's story of his journalistic career, published in 1935, started the cycle of foreign correspondents' autobiographies that is still going strong. Gunther is best known for his "Inside Europe" and "Inside Asia."
