

PRODUCTION OF Lima Will Be 500 BOMBERS A MONTH LOOMS

Americans Expected To Pilot Combat Craft Across Atlantic

ARMY AIDS IN DELIVERY Planes To Be Flown To Britain By Way Of U. S. Base In Iceland

WASHINGTON, July 14—(AP)—Official forecasts of greatly increased airplane production beginning in October were coupled today with indications in authoritative quarters that scores of young American pilots ultimately will engage in ferrying combat craft across the Atlantic to Britain.

By October, defense officials say, tributary industries such as aluminum will begin to turn out needed supplies in quantities that will permit plane manufacturers to run huge new assembly plants at virtually full speed with emphasis on attaining the goal of 500 bombers a month.

At least half of these two and four-motor ships will be turned over to the British, it is expected, giving Britain's Avro Corp., which handles ferry deliveries, a task far exceeding its present job. Already one major step to expedite the movement of these planes by American fliers has been taken by the army thru creation of a "ferry command" which now is handling the entire job of transferring planes from the factories to coastal bases where the British take them over.

The ferry command has undertaken a program of training 100 pilots a month in flying multi-engine planes. In itself, this leaves unmet the big job of getting them across the Atlantic. Several possible solutions are being discussed here. All involve the increased use of United States fliers over the Atlantic.

One possibility growing out of the recent occupation of Iceland is that the ferry command will turn over planes to the British in Iceland, going there by way of United States bases in Newfoundland and Greenland. Another possibility is that the army air corps may permit some pilots to resign in order to join Avro's staff.

DEPORTATION ORDERED FOR GERMAN AGENT

MILWAUKEE, July 14—(AP)—Eugene J. Buerk, under federal court indictment charging failure to register as an agent of a foreign government, will sail for Germany July 15 under an order signed today by Federal Judge F. Ryan Duffy.

Court attaches explained that the order, in effect, was tantamount to deportation. The order was based on a stipulation signed by E. J. Koelner, an assistant U. S. district attorney, and Buerk's counsel.

Judge Duffy said the charge against Buerk would remain in effect as will the \$10,000 bond on which he has been at liberty.

CONGRESS MAY SEE EXHIBITION BY U. S. ARMY

WASHINGTON, July 14—(AP)—Geno Sam's military might will be demonstrated for members of congress.

General G. C. Marshall, chief of state, is arranging the event at the request of Rep. Thom (D-Ohio) who suggested that it would be an answer to those who doubt the army's strength.

Thom wrote to General Marshall that members of congress would like an opportunity to see the fighting forces in action at a camp near Washington.

The war department, the general replied, "is in the process of arranging a demonstration of army equipment such as you suggest. You and the other members of congress will be advised of the time and place as soon as arrangements are completed."
