AFL Unions Plan High Court Move in Picket Case

one of the hotels during the weekend after a conference of AFL leaders and attorneys. Picketing at the other hotel ceased some time ago under an agreement with the management. Pickets began their march in front of the hotels in November, 1939. Gehrz was to confer on disputed
