

# Great Musical Comedy Will Open At Lyric Tuesday

## "Sis Hopkins" Has Judy Canova, Charles Butterworth, Jerry Colonna And Bob Crosby's Orchestra In Cast

"Sis Hopkins," new musical comedy which commences Tuesday at the Lyric theatre, features an all-star cast including Judy Canova, Charles Butterworth, Bob Crosby and his orchestra, Jerry Colonna and Susan Hayward in a story of a "hill-billy" cousin made "big" in a good way. Also showing will be "Law of the Wolf" while the concluding double bill contains "Her First Romance" and "Meet the Wildcat."

Trying to make up her mind which of her ardent swains to choose provides the basis for Ginger Rogers' day dreams in the film, "Tom Dick and Harry," currently at the Ohio theatre. She imagines, in her dreams, what life with each one would be like. The ardent swains are portrayed by George Murphy, Burgess Meredith and Alan Marshall.

When a woman-hater inherits a swank beauty salon full of glamorous, clamorous cuties and finds a red-hot murder mystery tossed in his lap, the result is fun and thrills galore. That's what audiences are promised in "For Beauty's Sake," the current Quilna attraction which stars Ned Sparks, Marjorie Weaver, Ted North and Marjorie Weaver. Co-feature is Jane Jones in "A Very Young Lady," starring Loretta Young and Robert Preston, is the current Sigma attraction and is a comedy of modern brisk tempo against the frontier background of Wyoming in the 1870's. Others in the cast of the film are Edward Arnold, Frank Craven, Gladys George, Jessie Ralph, Stanley Fields and Willie Best.

The film that has commanded the attention of the nation's theatre-goers for pure simplicity in entertainment feature is "Meet John Doe," starring Gary Cooper and Barbara Stanwyck. Other outstanding roles in the story of a man who merely desires to live simply and happily are Walter Brennan and Edward Arnold. Co-feature is "Road Show."

Showing for the last time Monday at the Majestic theatre are "Wallaby Jim of the Island" and "Andy Hardy's Private Secretary."

Vivacious Ginger Rogers, whose deft portrayals of the typical American girl have made her one of the most popular and best-loved stars of the screen, delivers another excellent characterization in "Tom, Dick and Harry," which is now at the Ohio theatre.

In contrast to the versatile Ginger's last film "Kitty Foyle," which won her the famous Academy Award, the current romantic comedy presents the talented young actress as a very romantic, highly imaginative telephone girl. George Murphy, Alan Marshall and Burgess Meredith are seen in the title roles, turning in a triple-threat performance that further reveals their propensities for sprightly comedy.

The happy plot rotates on the unique situation of a pretty girl getting engaged to three men at the same time. Murphy is Tom, a live-wire auto salesman who, after going steady with the telephone girl for three years, catches her in a weak moment and proposes—and is accepted.

Meredith is Harry, a happy-go-lucky garage mechanic and the

Marshall, of course, is the rich boy in the case and Ginger's secret passion. She maneuvers herself into a date with him and after a whirlwind evening of flying and night-clubbing the two likewise become affianced.

These hilarious scenes which link these three episodes together make for riotous comedy. It wouldn't be fair to divulge how the madcap young lady extricates herself from the boys' demand that she make a choice, but suffice it to say the surprise-twist ending is truly delightful.

In addition to the four principals, others in the notable cast who earn recognition are Joe Cunningham, Jane Seymour and Lenore Longren, as Ginger's family; Vicki Lester and Phil Silvers.

LYRIC  
Judy Canova returns to delight local audiences in a brand new hit this coming Tuesday at the Lyric theatre, where "Sis Hopkins" will run for three days. As "Sis Hopkins" she misunderstands the newspaper caption announcing the retirement of her rich Uncle Horace Hopkins and constructs and out of a job. She strikes him, inviting him to come and live on her farm until he gets on his feet again.

Horace (played by Charlie Butterworth) is completely fed up with his socially ambitious wife (Katherine Alexander) and his selfish daughter (Susan Hayward) and accepts her invitation. He arrives at the Sis Hopkins farm just in time to see it burn to the ground.

To repay Sis' generous hospitality, which has touched his heart, he in turn invites her to come and live at his home. Her arrival creates great consternation with Mrs. Hopkins, who regards this intrusion of a hillbilly poor relation as a threat to her social prestige and her daughter Carol's matrimonial chances with Jeff Farnsworth, played by Bob Crosby.

Sis finds it difficult to understand city ways, and she becomes a thorn in the flesh of her cousin Carol. A couple of Carol's catty girl friends persuade Horace to send Sis to college, knowing that this will further humiliate Carol. It is her adventures in college that provide the sprightly background against which the plot takes place.

# PAPER PROFITS ACCUMULATE ON GRAIN ADVANCES

## Government And Cooperating Farmers \$50,000,000 Ahead Since 1938

CHICAGO, July 28—(AP)—The war-time advance in grain prices has given Uncle Sam and cooperating farmers a paper profit on over-normal granary supplies accumulated since 1938 which trade statistics indicated today may exceed \$50,000,000.

This profit, however, could not be realized immediately under present market conditions because selling would upset prices. It represents an inventory appreciation as a result of higher prices attributed partly to the government's own program and partly to increasing domestic and foreign demand.

The government owns approximately 370,000,000 bushels of wheat, corn and rye while private owners have approximately 340,000,000 bushels of wheat, corn, barley and rye and about 100,000,000 bushels of soybeans, an aggregate of slightly more than 710,000,000 bushels, was accumulated when prices were lower than now.

Although the difference between current market prices for this grain and original loan rates does not represent the actual inventory profit accrued, the following comparisons give some idea of what has occurred:

The government owns approximately 174,000,000 bushels of 1940 wheat on which the original loan, based on Chicago's \$1 cent a bushel. The present price is around \$1.05. Producers still have under seal about 49,000,000 bushels after redeeming almost 7,000,000 bushels of 1939 and almost 55,000,000 bushels of 1940 wheat.

The government owns about 202,000,000 bushels of corn on which the original loan at the farm was around 57 cents. On June 15 the farm price was around 85 cents and there since has been a gain. Producers still have under seal about 98,000,000 bushels of 1940 corn on which the original loan rate was 61 cents at the farm.
