## Razing Will Cost Plenty. Says Zanuck

Town To Be Torn Down And Site Restored To Respectable Pasture

By CHARLES R. MOORE (United Press Staff Correspondent) CERRIG CEINNEN, Calif., Aug. 2-(UP)-Here, some 50 miles from Hollywood, the moving picture people have constructed a small corner of Wales. It was built from photographs of a village which since has been bombed to pieces and is so authentic that the real Welsh actors get homesick.

Darryl F. Zanuck, producing "How Green Was My Vailey," for 20th Century-Fox, spent more than \$100,000 huilding it and estimates it will cost a like amount to tear it down and make a respectable cow pasture of it

That is one of the headaches involved in making pictures on somebody else's cow pasture. You not only have to build your set but you have to tear it down again and put things into such shape that the cows will never know you've been there.

The mining village of Cerrig Ceinnen, Glamorgan, Wales, has been simulated along the edge of the San Fernando valley. It is a spot no mosie camera has poked into before, altho many an another-Indian-bit-the-dust melodrama has been filmed in the area around Calabasas, a few miles away.

Cerrig Cennen is located atop a hill, its main street running up to the coal nune which furnishes employment, part of the time, for

the village's residents. To this village Director John Ford each morning leads an expedition of about 300 people, including 70 Welsh singing actors. They spend the day at work there, then trek back to Hollywood by bus in the evening.

There is a stone chapel, a row of stone cottages, shops and four taverns. Coal mining, even for the movies, is a thirsty business. Posters advertised some 20 brands of Welsh ale but all anyone could actually buy was soda pop.

The chapel, in the shade of a large oak tree, dominates the cennart of the village

Director Ford said it was the only part of the set with which he was not completely satisfied. "That oak tree," he said, "is Loo perfect. No one will believe it is real, and not just put there by the prop department

Today Ford was shooting at the pit ahead.

It took all day to film the dramatic scene in which the mine is closed and sooty-faced miners, angry and despairing, march back to their homes.

Their women watch silently for a time, then burst into an emotional Welsh anthem. The men join them as they walk toward their homes, the procession dwindling as one after the other turns into his yard.
