

March, Betty Field Together In Hit Scheduled At State

"Victory" Is Dramatic Story Of A Great Love; "Too Many Blondes" Will Be Second Film On Bill

Fredric March and Betty Field are the stars of the forthcoming "Victory," commencing Thursday at the State theatre with "Too Many Blondes." March is cast as the recluse who desires to live alone on a tropical island until he meets a woman who desires to share it. Showing for the last times Wednesday are "A Woman's Face," and "Here Comes Happiness."

The Quilna theatre offers "Dance Hall," with Cesar Romero and Carole Landis in the lead roles. Romero is the manager of a dance hall, the darling of all women and concited about his attractiveness until he is taken down a few pegs by Carole Landis, the singer he has engaged. Co-featured is "The Bride Wore Crutches," starring Lynne Roberts and Ted North.

Merle Oberon and Melynn Douglas are co-starred as the blissfully happy couple who discover they have no right to be happy in "That Uncertain Feeling," currently at the Sigma theatre. Burgess Meredith creates a comic sensation as the wild-haired pianist with a leaning-toward surrealist art and Alan Mowbray scores as the psychoanalyst.

The story of a mad, romance-filled comedy of Hollywood, "The Goldwyn Follies," is offered at the Lyric theatre with such stars offered as Charlie McCarthy and Edgar Bergen, Andrea Leeds, Kemy Baker, the Fitz Brothers, Phil Baker, Adolphe Menjou and Jerome Cowan. Co-featured is "Dead End."

Brought to the screen with all the heart-stirring sweep and power of the original story, "The Shepherd of the Hills," stars John Wayne, Betty Field and Harry Carey at the other theatre in picturesque roles of Ozark hill folk. Others in the cast of the film include Beulah Bondi, Samuel S. Hinds, James Barton, Marjorie Main and Ward Bond.

With the added scope of the motion picture, the film version, naturally augments the production with more realistic sets, greater and more effective lighting, for the action which lays bare the quivering souls of seven condemned men.

The convict roles are handled by Preston S. Foster, Howard Phillips, Alan Roscoe, George E. Stone, Paul Fix, Al Hill and Daniel L. Haynes. And the prison officials are played by Frank Sheridan, Alec B. Francis, Edward van Sloan, Albert J. Smith, Kenneth McDonald and William Scott.

Tim McCoy's latest contribution to the screen — "The Fighting Renegade," a vividly thrilling western also opens at the Lyric theatre Thursday. McCoy is, of course, no stranger to such demonstrations, but he is one actor who thoroughly appreciates his public, and is as eager for praise today, as he was when he first began his long and honored career in films.

High comedy at its brightest and best is unrelieved while "That Uncertain Feeling" at the Sigma theatre. This new comedy co-stars Melynn Douglas and Merle Oberon.

Briefly described, "That Uncertain Feeling" plots its hilarious course around the rival-meets-husband-meets wife theme. It tosses a psychoanalyst into the bosom of a happy family as played brilliantly by Merle Oberon and Melynn Douglas.

Douglas and Miss Oberon discover that according to the rules of Freud they have no right to be blissfully happy. Burgess Meredith, featured in support of the stars, pops up as an eccentric and entirely uninhibited pianist with a yen for surrealist art and thru him, Miss Oberon thinks she can work

the man's confidence by posing as a dangerous escaped criminal. But more trouble comes when the gang decides to drag him in on a big grim task of wielding a sub-machine gun!

From there it's really hold on to your seats as the film speeds into a five-star-final climax, in which the big job is thwarted with the cub scoring the biggest beat of the year and winning lovely Lynne for himself.

Featured with Lynne Roberts and Ted North in the fine cast of "The Bride Wore Crutches," are some top-notch screen personalities. Edgar Kennedy of the famous "slow-burn" has a fine role as a comic police captain while Robert Armstrong is on the other side of the law — a smooth gangster. Lionel Stander is "Flannel-mouth" Moran, gunman extraordinary, and Richard Lane is the high-pressure managing editor.

OHIO One of the most exciting stories in American fiction springs into vivid, powerful reality on the screen of the Ohio theatre in "The Shepherd of the Hills."

Harold Bell Wright's story has lost nothing in its transfer to the screen. Rather, the tale is more vivid, more compelling, as told by the camera. This is due, in large measure, to the superb acting ability of its stars, John Wayne, Betty Field and Harry Carey, and the brilliant supporting cast. Each seems perfectly cast; each gets to the very heart of the characters.

Henry Hathaway's direction is noticeable thruout the picture, in its great outdoor scenes with their colorful magnificence, in the unswerving path followed by the picture, right up to the shattering climax of the gun duel between John Wayne and Harry Carey, as father and son, and the romance between Wayne and Field.

Known to millions of readers the story of "The Shepherd of the Hills" concerns the blood oath sworn by Young Matt, the impetuous, reckless young Ozarks mountaineer, to search out and kill his own father, a man he has never seen, for putting a curse upon his life by abandoning his mother and driving her to an early grave.

Among the supporting cast in a leading featured role is James Barton, the famous Jetter Lester of the Broadway stage play, "To Have and Have Not." Others who contribute exceptionally effective character portrayals are Beulah Bondi, Samuel S. Hinds, Marjorie Main and Marc Lawrence.
