### Disney Studios Close; Reductions in Staff Planned

HOLLYWOOD --(U.P.)--The board of directors of Walt Disney productions has ordered the studio closed for two weeks and announced operations could not be continued "unless a substantial reduction in personnel was

The order followed by two weeks submission to the Na-tional Labor Relations Board of a dispute between the studio and the Screen Cartoon Guild (American Federation of Labor) which had been on strike three months.

"For some time it has been obvious that because of the loss of a large part of its world market, the company could not continue its operations unless a substantial reduction in personnel was made," said Gunther Lessing,

vice-president.
"The necessity for such reduction is readily conceded by the Screen Cartoon Guild. The matter of this layoff was in issue in the recent arbitration proceedings before federal conciliators, and the award provided that any disagreement between the union and the company as to the persons to be laid off was to be submitted to an arbitrator."

Lessing did not indicate the number of employes which the studio proposes to lay off. In all there are approximately 1.200 workers, including some
