Evil Spirits Cause Housing Shortage

BLUFF, Utah (U.P.)—Navajo Indians of southeastern Utah have a unique method of keeping evil spirits out of the Happy Hunting Grounds—but it sometimes creates a housing problem. Navajo religion teaches that the "Tehindis," or devils, believed to lurk around a deathbed cannot climb above ground level. When a tribesman dies, members of the family immediately seal all lower exits from the hut, then cut a hole high in the south wall. Through this, the dead spirit flees happily to the great beyond—with all demons safely imprisoned below. The hogan is then abandoned. But a rising death rate has cut heavily into the housing resources of even these nomadic Indians. Some tribes now are building temporary shelters for the purpose.

Dental Hygienists in Public Health Need State's OK

Dental hygienists in public health must be certified by the newly named state committee of examiners before qualifying for new positions in their field. Dr. Francis A. Bull, secretary, warned today. The new state law does not affect public health dental hygienists already so employed except when they transfer to other employing agencies. Dr. Bull, state supervisor of dental education, represents the state board of health on the committee of examiners. The other members of the group are Dr. C. J. Baumann, Milwaukee, representing the state board of dental examiners, and J. F. Waddell, representing the state department of public instruction. At an organization meeting at Milwaukee last week the committee ruled that all dental hygienists seeking public health positions in the state must appear at 10 a. m. Tuesday, Aug. 26, at the Marquette university dental school for certification, and should notify Dr. Bull, state board of health, not later than Aug. 23 of their intention to appear.

Five Killed, Six Hurt in Minnesota Wreck

CHASKA, Minn. (U.P.)—Five persons were killed and six others injured seriously Sunday when a blowout sent one automobile crashing head on into another two miles east of Cologne. The dead were Mrs. Harold Bouchard, 35, and a daughter, about 14, Frank McCue, 79, and his wife, 78, and Mrs. Joseph Lauer, 32, all of Minneapolis. The injured were Bouchard and two other daughters, Lauer, and his daughter, Marian, 11, and his mother, Mrs. Anna Lauer, Hopkins, Minn.

Nine Persons Die From Bad Food on Jap Vessel

NEW YORK (U.P.)—The Domei (Japanese) news agency reported Sunday nine persons had died and 111 were ill from ptomaine poisoning aboard the Japanese liner Taun Maru shortly before it reached Japan from San Francisco. The dispatch, datelined Yokohama, said all of those ill were receiving treatment in Yokohama hospitals and that three were in critical condition. Police of Kanagawa prefectural sanitary bureau, Domei said, were investigating. They claimed omelettes served on the last day of the voyage caused the poisonings. The ship's doctor said the cause of the epidemic was not yet definitely established. He said, however, that the extreme heat, fatigue among the passengers caused by the strain and uncertainty of the vessel's course and a lack of adequate medical supplies and help were contributing factors.

Nine Feared Killed While Scaling Alps

ZURICH, Switz. (U.P.)—Nine members of a party of 13 were feared killed Sunday while mountain-climbing in the Valaisian Alps near the resort village of Saas-Fee. One body and four seriously injured members of the party have been found.

GOLFER SWINGS, BREAKS LEG

Mighty Bumpy Road

SAN FRANCISCO (U.P.)—LeRoy McGinnis, a visitor in San Francisco from Colorado, wanted to drive the shortest route downtown. Accompanied by his wife and child, he figured Twin Peaks tunnel looked like the best bet. Pedestrians who saw him drive into the two mile tunnel called police. They didn't dare follow, but called a wrecking truck and sped to the other end. "Mighty bumpy," said McGinnis to officers who flagged him down as he came out of the tunnel. "Oughta fill them chuck-holes." "That," said the police, "is a street-car tunnel. It never was paved and probably never will be."

Army Flier Killed in Panama Accident

PANAMA CITY (U.P.)—Second Lieutenant Harold G. Skog, Elmira, N. Y., was killed Sunday and Second Lieutenant Francis H. Dresser, Manhattan, Kan., was injured critically when two army pursuit planes of the Rio Hato air base collided. Ninety-nine per cent of the buildings and homes in Switzerland are now wired for electricity.

Evil Spirits Cause Housing Shortage

BLUFF, Utah (U.P.)—Navajo Indians of southeastern Utah have a unique method of keeping evil spirits out of the Happy Hunting Grounds—but it sometimes creates a housing problem. Navajo religion teaches that the "Tehindis," or devils, believed to lurk around a deathbed cannot climb above ground level. When a tribesman dies, members of the family immediately seal all lower exits from the hut, then cut a hole high in the south wall. Through this, the dead spirit flees happily to the great beyond—with all demons safely imprisoned below. The hogan is then abandoned. But a rising death rate has cut heavily into the housing resources of even these nomadic Indians. Some tribes now are building temporary shelters for the purpose.

Dental Hygienists in Public Health Need State's OK

Dental hygienists in public health must be certified by the newly named state committee of examiners before qualifying for new positions in their field. Dr. Francis A. Bull, secretary, warned today. The new state law does not affect public health dental hygienists already so employed except when they transfer to other employing agencies. Dr. Bull, state supervisor of dental education, represents the state board of health on the committee of examiners. The other members of the group are Dr. C. J. Baumann, Milwaukee, representing the state board of dental examiners, and J. F. Waddell, representing the state department of public instruction. At an organization meeting at Milwaukee last week the committee ruled that all dental hygienists seeking public health positions in the state must appear at 10 a. m. Tuesday, Aug. 26, at the Marquette university dental school for certification, and should notify Dr. Bull, state board of health, not later than Aug. 23 of their intention to appear.

Five Killed, Six Hurt in Minnesota Wreck

CHASKA, Minn. (U.P.)—Five persons were killed and six others injured seriously Sunday when a blowout sent one automobile crashing head on into another two miles east of Cologne. The dead were Mrs. Harold Bouchard, 35, and a daughter, about 14, Frank McCue, 79, and his wife, 78, and Mrs. Joseph Lauer, 32, all of Minneapolis. The injured were Bouchard and two other daughters, Lauer, and his daughter, Marian, 11, and his mother, Mrs. Anna Lauer, Hopkins, Minn.

Nine Persons Die From Bad Food on Jap Vessel

NEW YORK (U.P.)—The Domei (Japanese) news agency reported Sunday nine persons had died and 111 were ill from ptomaine poisoning aboard the Japanese liner Taun Maru shortly before it reached Japan from San Francisco. The dispatch, datelined Yokohama, said all of those ill were receiving treatment in Yokohama hospitals and that three were in critical condition. Police of Kanagawa prefectural sanitary bureau, Domei said, were investigating. They claimed omelettes served on the last day of the voyage caused the poisonings. The ship's doctor said the cause of the epidemic was not yet definitely established. He said, however, that the extreme heat, fatigue among the passengers caused by the strain and uncertainty of the vessel's course and a lack of adequate medical supplies and help were contributing factors.

Nine Feared Killed While Scaling Alps

ZURICH, Switz. (U.P.)—Nine members of a party of 13 were feared killed Sunday while mountain-climbing in the Valaisian Alps near the resort village of Saas-Fee. One body and four seriously injured members of the party have been found.

COATESVILLE, Pa. (U.P.)—When Fred E. McKinney, Coatesville business man, hits a golf ball he really winds up. Teeing off at Coatesville Country club, McKinney swung—and broke his
