Library Set to Aid Cooks, Canners

Cooler weather and produce at its cheapest invite Madison housewives to get back into the kitchen for canning, preserving, and baking. Before they set their pots on the stove, the women may get some new ideas from the pamphlets and books at the Madison Free Library. The shelves offer a choice from 111 cookbooks and the reference room has numerous pamphlets on cookery. A new booklet, prepared in Madison by Mrs. Leo T. Grace, gives directions for using honey in preserves. She has also compiled a collection of recipes for using honey in desserts, salads, meats, and vegetables. Miss Abby Marlett's pamphlet describing ways to use Wisconsin apples emphasizes recipes for crabapple and other jellies. It also contains instructions for preparing desserts and salads.

Government bulletins from state and federal departments are reliable sources of information for those who do much canning. Like the other library pamphlets, these may be borrowed for a week. The rising price of foods makes books that will help slice the family food budget especially popular. Clare Newman and Bell Wiley have prepared a "Cookbook of Leftovers" that will cut down on waste. The Browns start economizing with the shopper, and advise housewives to "look before you cook" in a Consumer's Union publication concerned with the purchase of food and kitchen equipment. Their "Most For Your Money Cookbook" is three years old but its recipes are still being used.

New England Recipes The source of numerous collections, the latest being "Good Main Food Recipes From Old Hundred," and the "Yankee Cookbook." Recipes from the Pennsylvania Dutch, New Orleans, the Scandinavian, and other foreign countries are also available. Experienced chefs will find it fun to experiment with the recipes in books that specialize in "Soups, Sauces, and Gravies," "Fish and Sea Food Cook Book," "Pies A-Plenty," "Formal Dinners," "Party Menus and Recipes," and "The Hunt's Salad Book." Working wives will be interested in the suggestions of Ida Bailey Allen's "Time-Saving Cook Book," M. D. Chambers' "One-Piece Dinners," Mabel Claire's "Busy Woman's Cook Book," Virginia Porter's "Canned Foods Cook Book," and Mrs. Hill's "Cooking For Two."
