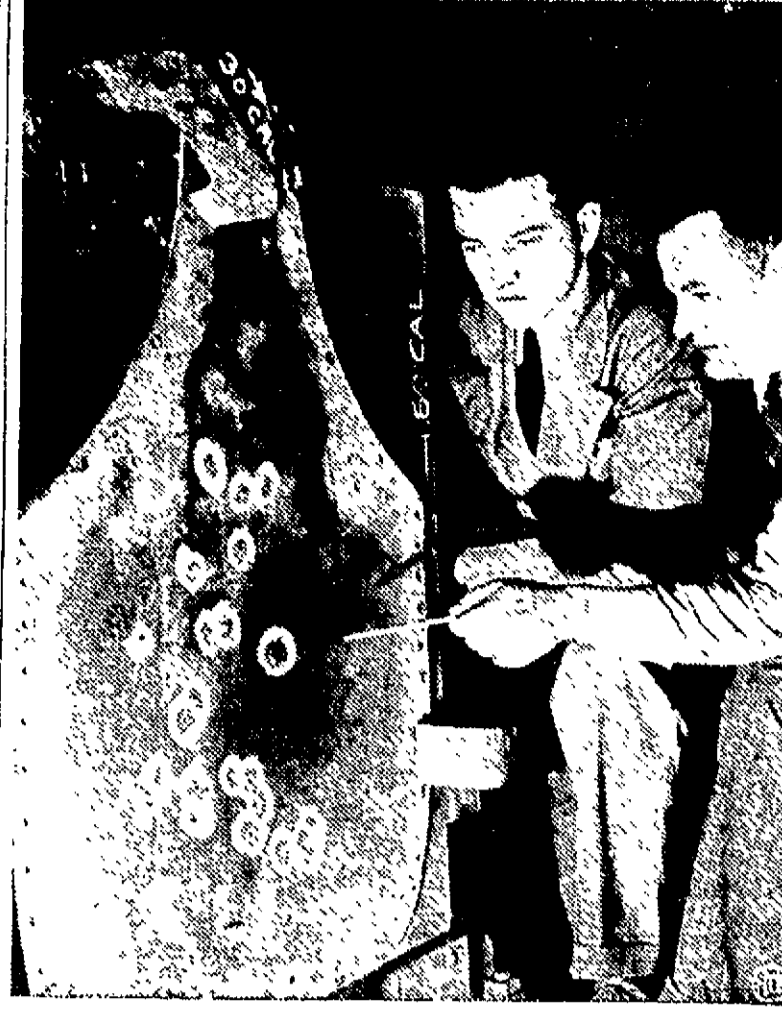

PLANE DESIGNER NOW CAN LAUGH AT PROFESSORS

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Sept. 5—(UP)—Robert J. Woods, whose college professors told him he never would be an aeronautical engineer is the Youngstown-born designer of the Bell Airacuda and the Bell Airacobra.

Woods was orphaned at 17 and worked to send himself thru high school and night school.

When his family's estate was settled, he received \$1,200 and with this money attended the University of Michigan.

One day one of his professors detained him long enough to advise:

"Woods, you'd better give up your aeronautical engineering and specialize in something else. You're just not cut out for it. You'll never make an aeronautical engineer. It's not in you."

After a series of positions with the Towle Aircraft Co., the Detroit Aviation Corp., Lockheed and Consolidated, Woods went with Bell as chief engineer, when he was 30.

The Airacuda and Airacobra are rated as two of the most vicious fighting planes produced by American concerns. The Airacobra has been dived at more than 600 miles an hour.

1852 NEWS ITEM REVEALS RELIC OF WASHINGTON PRIZED BY HENRY CLAY

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Sept. 5—(UP)—One of Henry Clay's most prized possessions was a wooden ring that held a piece of George Washington's coffin.

This fact is disclosed in an Alabama newspaper of 1852 that reposes in the collection of the State Department of Archives and History.

How Clay got the chip from the Washington coffin was not revealed in the story, which was printed in the Jacksonville, Ala., Republican on Tuesday, Aug. 3, 1852.

The story quoted a Louisville newspaper's account of Henry Clay's will for probate and gave details of the disposition of the Clay estate.

One of the most interesting details of the will is the codicil relating to Clay's Negro slaves. This opposition to slavery of the man who made four unsuccessful bids for the Presidency is amply recorded by historians. It was during his unsuccessful fight to keep Texas out of the Union, to curtail slavery, that Clay said, "I'd rather be right than be President."

The codicil orders the executors of the Clay will to free his slaves, as follows: "... that all the children of his slaves born after the first of January, 1850 (Clay died in 1852) be liberated and sent to Liberia—the males at the age of 25 and the females at the age of 28."

The will set aside three years of the earnings of the slaves to outfit them for the trip to the African republic. Clay also requested they be taught to "read, write and cipher. Those who were his slaves before 1850 he gave to members of his family.

The ring with the chip of Washington's coffin Clay bequeathed to Henry S. Duncan. A snuff box reported to have belonged to Peter the Great of Russia, Clay gave to W. N. Mercer. Clay's Kentucky estate was called Ashland.

Ashland, Ala., is the county seat of Clay-co, both named for the famous Southerner.

HAMILTON MEN'S COLLEGE COUNTS THREE ALUMNAE

CLINTON, N. Y., Sept. 5—(UP)—Hamilton college is strictly for men, but it has three alumnae.

The college awarded an honorary degree to Miss Alice Van Vechten Brown, professor of Art emerita at Wellesley college and the daughter of a former Hamilton president, at 1911 commencement exercises.

Previously only two women had received honorary degrees, Ruth Draper in 1921 and Helen Hayes in 1938.

PET TARANTULA KIND TO HAND THAT FEEDS IT

WACO, Tex., Sept. 5—(UP)—Oscar doesn't look it, but he is domesticated. He's the favorite pet of Dr. Leo T. Murray, curator of the Baylor University museum.

Murray captured the tarantula in Oklahoma and brought it to Waco in a glass bottle. Now Oscar lives in a cage, but not all the time.

The insect exercises daily by walking on the arms and body of Murray.

The Curator isn't afraid of being bitten by the enormous spider, he said, because Oscar is a smart tarantula.

"Different from some people, he knows better than to bite the hand that feeds him."

Oscar's diet is two crickets a week.

"I'd like 'Gilly' and the snakes for the museum," Murray said, "but I just haven't the heart to kill them."

The curator spiked a popular rumor that tarantula bites are poisonous.

"They aren't," he said, "they're only infectious. According to the dictionary, they produce 'tarantism,' which is defined as 'a nervous condition characterized by melancholy, stupor and an uncontrollable desire to dance.'"
