Cooking School to Show How to Balance Meals

Nutrition experts agree that proper eating habits will improve the health of the family. Nutrition has advanced tremendously with new knowledge regarding vitamins, and it is now generally known that much lack of ambition and zeal are due to improperly balanced meals.

Miss Portia Winters, who will conduct the annual cooking and homemaking school of The Wisconsin State Journal, will devote much of her time to discussion and demonstration of well-balanced menus and proper foods.

All main features of previous schools will be retained. When she is not giving cooking demonstrations, Miss Winters spends her time in food research.

Salads to be Stressed: Outstanding in the discussion of better, more healthful menus will be a demonstration on salads. No matter what the season salads are a regular and important part of dinner.

Good Diet Needn't Be Costly: 'A healthy, well-fed family is the surest basis of a strong nation,' says Miss Winters, 'but that does not necessarily mean an elaborate and expensive diet.'

'It is important that we give our families plenty of the protective foods, such as milk, eggs, and dairy products, fruits and vegetables, so as to include all essentials of an adequate diet. We have learned a lot about these foundations of health, but some of us have failed to put that information into practical use.'

The program this year will be entirely new and different. The foods Miss Winters prepares before the audience will be given away. Last year more than 2,000 women regularly attended the sessions where hundreds of recipes and cooking tips were given away.

House to Accept Tax Exemptions, George Predicts

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Chairman Walter F. George, (D., Ga.), of the senate finance committee predicted Saturday night that house conferees on the \$3,563,900 revenue bill will accept the senate amendment lowering income tax exemptions.

George revealed that informal conferences with the house will begin Wednesday, and said he hoped the bill could be completed in two or three days so that the formal action could be taken when the house resumes work Sept. 15 after its current recess.

George foresaw some dispute between the houses over a senate amendment eliminating a special 10 per cent excess profits tax on certain types of corporations which cut \$77,700,000 out of the bill, and the senate action adding one percentage point to the house surtax rates on corporations, which added \$120,500,000.

One Dies as Motor, Locomotive Crash in Nebraska

WALTHILL, Neb. (U.P.)—One person was killed and more than a dozen injured when a Burlington northbound Diesel powered passenger motor train en route to Sioux City, collided with a lone locomotive on the track near here tonight.

The train was destroyed by fire after the crash. The dead man was identified as Alfred Thompson, South Sioux City, Neb., a bridge foreman for the Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha railroad.

Passengers were in the rear end of the motor train and all were removed before the fire reached them, according to reports from the scene.

Unknowing, Man Kills His Granddaughter

DETROIT (U.P.)—William Molnar was horrified when the crumpled body of his 18-month-old granddaughter, Rose Le Pero, was found on the lawn of her parents' home at suburban Trenton.

He asked state police to investigate. They found the girl's ankle was broken and theorized she must have been hit where her body was found because the injury would prevent her from walking.

Only then did Molnar remember that shortly before her body was discovered he had backed his truck onto the lawn. Police said his truck had passed over and killed the child accidentally.

Kenosha Man Hurt But Blocks Robbery

KENOSHA (U.P.)—Kenosha police today hunted an unidentified man who seriously wounded Louis Klein, 45, a grocery store owner, when he refused to open his cash drawer.

Instead of giving up the \$250 he had in the store, Klein seized a catsup bottle and started after the bandit. Before he reached him, the intruder fired his revolver twice, one bullet striking Klein in the neck and the other in the arm. The bandit escaped by way of an alley without loot.
