

Musical Hit Scheduled To Open At The State Thursday

"Pot O' Gold" Features Horace Heidt And Band And James Stewart And Paulette Goddard; Tracy At The Ohio

A great musical hit, "Pot O' Gold," with Horace Heidt and his band, is scheduled to open Thursday at the State. Also having big parts are James Stewart and Paulette Goddard. Completing the bill will be "Affectionately Yours," starring lovely Merle Oberon, Dennis Morgan and Rita Hayworth. "In the Navy," and "The Penalty," show thru Wednesday.

All those who have seen "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," at the Ohio theatre agree that Spencer Tracy is at his best in this film which tells of a doctor who turned himself from an honored man into a monster. It will show thru Friday and on Saturday "Aloma of the South Seas," with lovely Dorothy Lamour and Jon Hall will commence.

Continuing to attract patrons to the Quilna theatre is "Sun Valley Serenade," packed with music, comedy and romance. Featured roles are taken by lovely Sonja Henie, handsome John Payne, Milton Berle and Lynn Bari. Glenn Miller and his orchestra present many special musical numbers.

Current at the Lyric is "Penny Serenade," with Irene Dunne and Cary Grant. It is the story of a newspaperman, who after tiring of covering war events in a war zone, returns to California to operate a weekly newspaper. Co-feature is "Missing 10 Days," with Rex Harrison in the leading role.

Two great hits, "The Parson of Panamint," and "Hurry, Charlie, Hurry," will show at the Sigma theatre Wednesday thru Friday. In the first production Charles Ruggles and Ellen Drew have the leading roles while Leon Errol, Mildred Coles and Cecil Cunningham have the principal parts in the second hit.

Spencer Tracy does a waltz. Ingrid Bergman sings. Lana Turner wears costumes. These were all "firsts" for the trio of stars seen in "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," filmization of the famous Robert Louis Stevenson classic, now showing at the Ohio theatre. It has been a long time since Tracy has done any dancing, on or off the screen. Fortunately, Tracy danced with Miss Turner, who is one of the best dancers in Hollywood. At first a bit nervous about his footwork, Tracy turned in a creditable job of waltzing, with Miss Turner coaching.

Miss Bergman's role in the film called for her to sing the gay ditty, "You Should See Me Dance the Polka," with terror in her voice. Playing her greatest dramatic role as the little barroom singer who becomes the object of Hyde's sadistic affections, her singing provides one of the high-light emotional scenes of the film. Tracy has many surprises for

his audiences in his portrayal of the kindly Dr. Jekyll and the evil Mr. Hyde, different from any ever seen, but the star's secret until the picture is screened. He devoted months of study to the intriguing Jekyll and Hyde, creating his own interpretations.

"Missing Ten Days," after this dramatic introduction, plunges into one of the swiftest, most entertaining narratives, Harrison's performance, and that of lovely Karen Verne, who makes her screen debut in the new film as the girl in the case, are tops in smoothness, while supporting players are equally capable. The cast, in addition to the star and his beautiful heroine, includes C. V. France, Leo Genn, Joan Marion, Anthony Holles and John Abbott.

"Penny Serenade," new romantic drama produced and directed by George Stevens and starring Irene Dunne and Cary Grant, also shows. Morris Ryskind adapted "Penny Serenade" to the screen, from Martha Cheavens' delightful, glowing magazine novel of the same name. In the cast are Reulah Bondi, Edgar Buchanan and Ann Doran.




SIGMA

LIQUOR BOARD RULING FOUGHT
COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 17 — (UP) — The Ohio supreme court was asked today to consider the legality of a state liquor ruling against the importation and sale of beer in less than 12-ounce bottles.

DAMAGE ESTIMATED
COLUMBUS, O., Sept. 17 — (NS) — Damages caused by the derailment and subsequent burning of an oil tank car train on the outskirts of Columbus Monday was estimated at \$12,500 by Pennsylvania railroad officials. Eleven tank cars transporting crude oil were derailed and 100,000 gallons of oil burned.

The use of light airplanes was further demonstrated during the Third Army maneuvers held in the desert country north of El Paso, Tex. The planes were used for reconnaissance.



Holland's Tulips Are Victims of Invasion

The tulips of the Netherlands, world famous for almost four centuries, are being crushed by German invasion. The tulips which were Holland's pride are going into Nazi ersatz food substitutes and livestock fodder.

Tulips are pictured on the Netherlands semi-postal stamp above, the 1940 "For Children" issue. This series was released a few days before the Lowlands were invaded.

There's little room in Hitler's "new order" for flowers, Netherlands tulip growers report. Tulip bulbs are processed to make a coffee substitute, with real coffee costing \$2.50 a pound. Hyacinths have become cattle feed; narcissus bulbs yield starch. An ersatz flour is being made from various other bulbs.

Before the invasion, Netherlands tulip acreages were reduced about 50 per cent by defense preparations.

The tulip is not a native of Holland. The first bulbs were brought from Persia in the 16th century. Dutch growers have developed nearly 2000 varieties. Export of bulbs has been a major item of trade with United States.
