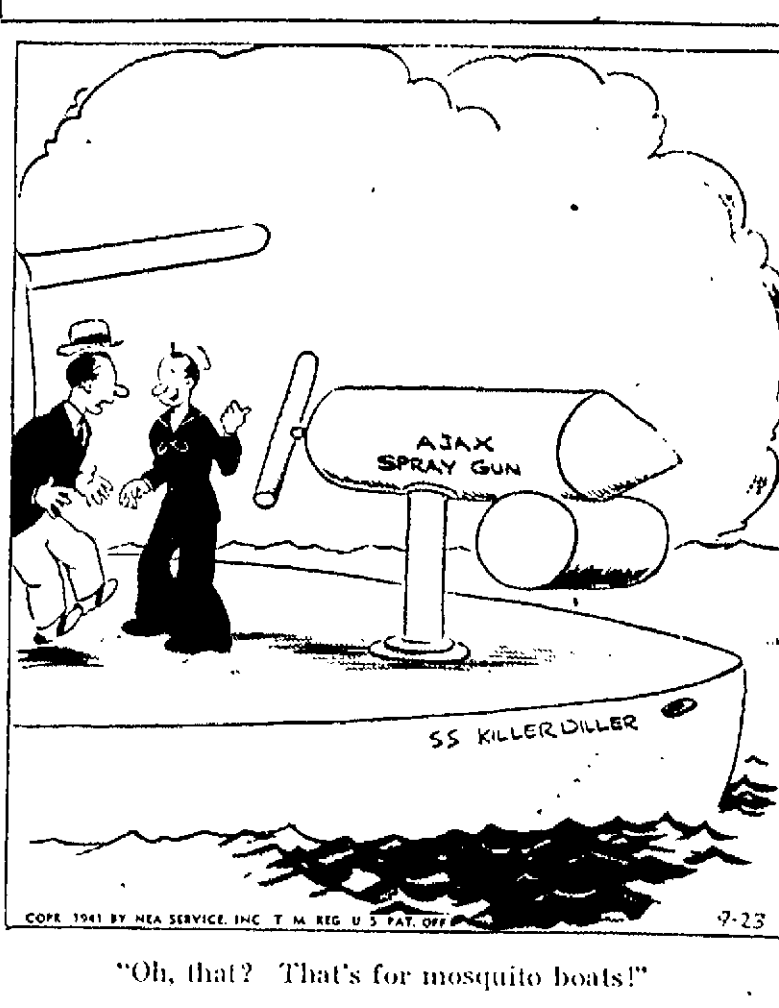

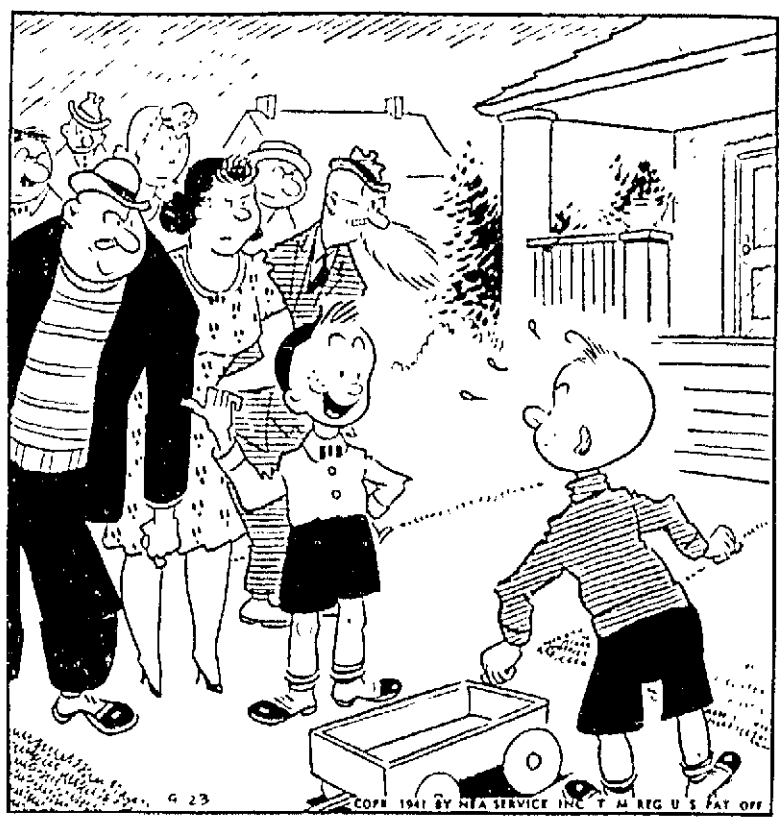

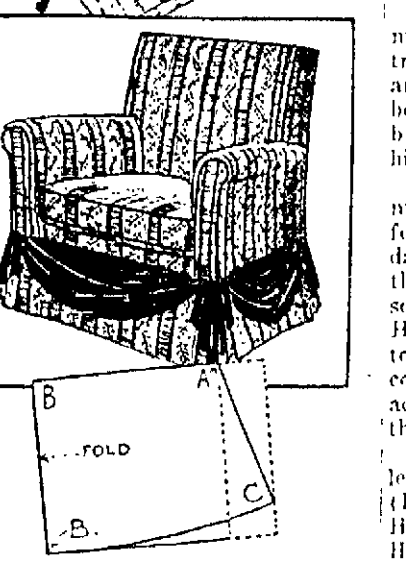

SMART FALL SLIP COVER EVEN AMATEURS CAN MAKE



Stunning! With this sweat slip cover your oldest chair becomes breath-takingly modern!

You can make it easily the pin-way-in-time for your fall fixing up. You'll find your own room colors, of course, but for a year-round cover green-striped saten would be lovely.

To start your cover, remove cushion and pin fabric to top of chair; then smooth and pin it over the inside back and seat, following a 4-inch tuck-in between. Cut 1 1/2 inches around pins for seams.

In the same way, fit and pin fabric to arms, front, back, sides and cushion, and cut out the underskirt. 4 straight panels joined with inverted pleats.

For each solid-color swag, cut a piece of fabric about 12 inches longer than the chair is wide and 1 1/2 times as deep as the underskirt. Fold width-wise B-B, as shown in our diagram, and cut from A to C; then drape.
