MONTREAL—(U.P.)—A home run in each of the first three innings Friday night gave the Montreal Royals the first game in the little world series over the Columbus Red Birds, 12 to 6. Alex Kamposki, Paul Campbell and Jack Graham connected for the circuit to build up a lead that proved plenty behind Max Macon, who was pitching for the international League playoff champions.

Emory Dickson, Columbus starter, set the stage for Kamposki's homer with the bases full in the first inning by walking three men. He was belted from the mound in the second. The Royals continued the assault against Frank Gabler, but Sam Nahem, third pitcher for the American Association club, finally stilled their bats. Macon allowed six hits and was coasting in the late innings behind his long lead.

Badger Boxers Open Drills on Wednesday

The introduction to what is believed will be another successful Badger Boxing season was announced Friday by Coach Johnny Walsh when he issued the first call for freshmen and new upper-class candidates. They will gather at 3:45 p. m. Wednesday in the boxing quarters in the stadium for the first in a series of three-weekly classes.

First Contour Plowing Elimination Held Today at La Crosse

LA CROSSE—(U.P.)—Plowmen from Pierce, Pepin, Buffalo, and Trempealeau counties were to compete at Alma today in the first of four Wisconsin eliminations to select contenders for the tri-state dairyland contour plowing championship. R. W. Davis, chairman of the La Crosse county soil conservation district supervisors and secretary of the match finals, scheduled to be held near here Oct. 8, said the tri-state meet was the first hillside event of its kind in the United States.
