workers pins a tiny red feather on the lapel of a Madison citizen who makes his pledge to the Community Union during the two-week drive, he'll be performing a ceremony dating back at least 500 years. In the days of Robin Hood it was the outlaw's custom to be-stow a red feather on the member of his band who performed some unusually good deed.

Another story about the origin of the custom has it that Edward, the famous Black Prince of England, awarded the red feather to the knights in his train who showed special valor.

The Winnebago Indians, who formerly occupied the site which is now Madison, always regarded the red feather as a badge of courage and manhood.

The use of the feather symbol

will be widespread during the Community Union campaign. Joseph Rothschild, general chairman, has asked that persons mak-ing pledges during the early part of the campaign, wear the feathers to avoid duplicate solicitation.


