An expanded program, involving the use of two new sites for its activities and the possibility of Madison members' appearance on Broadway, was announced Saturday by the Madison chapter of the Blackfriars' guild, national Catholic theatrical organization.

The guild will present its plays in Edgewood college's auditorium and will prepare them in rooms at 113 E. Mifflin st. provided by Mr. and Mrs. Leo Kehl. 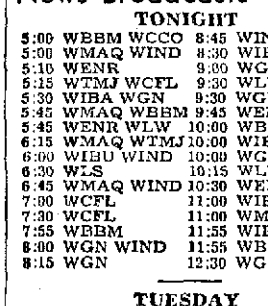
