## CAPTAIN TELLS OF SEA BATTLE

Graphic Account Given Of Sinking Of Submarine By British Ship

LONDON, Oct. 17—(INS)—A thrilling story of the Battle of the Atlantic has just been told in London by the captain of a British merchant ship. "We were sailing astern of a convoy," he said, "it was dusk. Suddenly the chief officers reported sighting a black object in the water—quite close. It was a U-boat coming straight for our ship." "As she attacked, we opened fire with the defensive machine gun, and I could see our tracers hitting and falling off her conning tower." "Her attack failed, and I tried to ram her, but could not get around fast enough." "When the U-boat attacked again we were able to get our main defensive gun to bear, and using machine-gun tracers to give

the direction, we hit the conning tower with the first shot—at almost point blank range." "Our second and third shots missed and the submarine made a crash dive." "He surfaced again in a few minutes, but this time further away, his conning tower being half awash." "We could see that he was maneuvering to get another shot at us, but our fourth shot struck the conning tower again and the submarine started to sink by the stern at an angle of forty-five degrees. Our fifth shot missed, but with the sixth, we scored another direct hit." "The U-boat then rolled over

## HUNTERS CHECK REPORT MISSING PLANE SIGHTED

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 17—(INS)—Major William Cahill, commander at Fort Bliss, today ordered searchers to check a report that the wreckage of a missing army observation plane had been sighted near a mountain 60 miles south of Carlsbad, N. M., close to the Texas-New Mexico border.

The plane has been unreported since it took from Biggs Field on Monday with three men aboard—Lt. Willis Hunt, 23, of Blytheville, Ark., the pilot; Lt. C. E. Kaiser of Louisville, Ky., and Staff Sgt. Richard Lauck of Denver.

Major Cahill said Sheriff Howell Gage of Carlsbad had reported sighting what appeared to be the wreckage of a plane, but could not be sure. Also he ordered a search in the Carlsbad vicinity, the commander said it was "doubtful" the plane would be found there.

Propellerless aerial gun turret that could fly straight up at 70 miles an hour are proposed by a California aircraft inventor as a novel means of air defense.

He said that magnesium is destined to be mined in great quantities in the United States as soon as more information of the metal is available. England, he said, is refining magnesium ores shipped into the country and also is distilling it with some degree of success from waters of the ocean.

Magnesium is used in the construction of non-stress parts of airplane motors. It is used in preference to aluminum because of its lighter weight. If a strengthening alloy can be found that does not increase the weight too much, the metal will be invaluable in airplane building, according to the English engineer.
