(Liux Neus Bureau) KENTON, Nov. 1-A resolution favoring expansion of the headwater lake program, even at the expense of other projects, was passed by members of the Hardinmeeting at the office of the chairman, Bill Crooks, here last night. The local committee, formed of

farmers and sportsmen, favored the present regulations on open seasons, legal lengths and bag limits. Questionnaires were answered by 15 persons. They had been sent out by the Ohio division of conservation and natural resources. Results of local questioning will be brought up at the district conservation meeting at

Ottawa no Nov. 6, Crooks said. Those attending the meeting also favored the continuation of the stream safety zone, closing of certain streams in each county during spawning season, setting aside of lake fish sanctuaries. designation of streams or parts of streams for bait purposes and game-fish angling and permitting a person to take not more than 50 minnows from game-fish streams

in the spawning season. Also approved were: "no motor" restrictions in the immediate fishng waters of inland lakes the prohibition of sale of all fish except minnows for bait; more emphasis and more money expended on increasing natural habitat in lakes and streams rather than on state hatcheries; the headwater lake program; the present open seasons; legal length and bag limits; wading the shore while fishing lakes, and further regulation of trot "nes.
