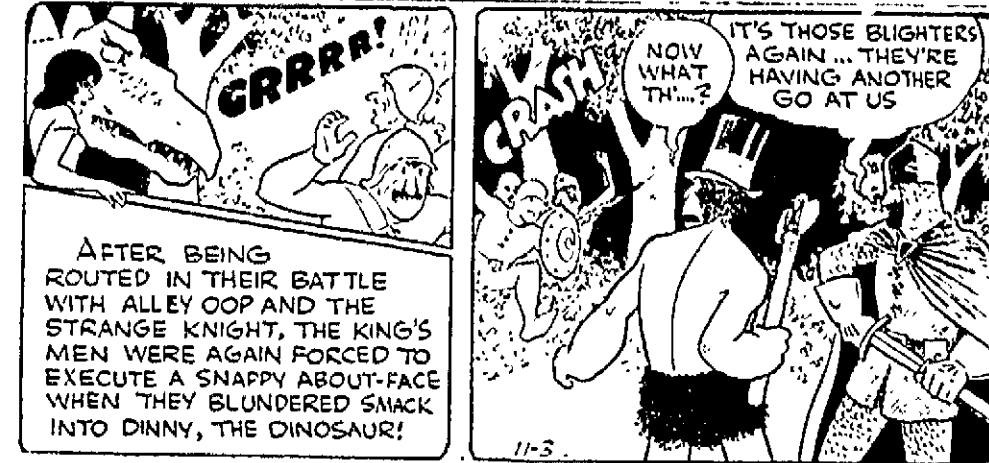

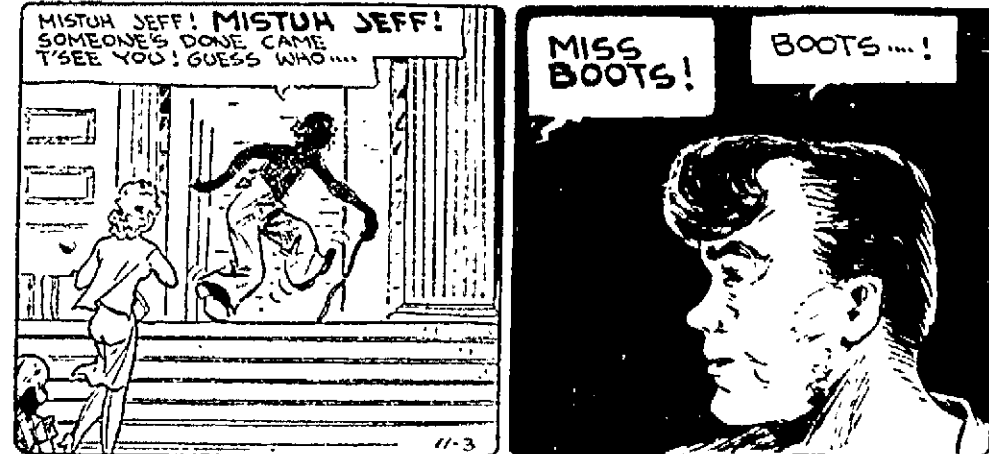

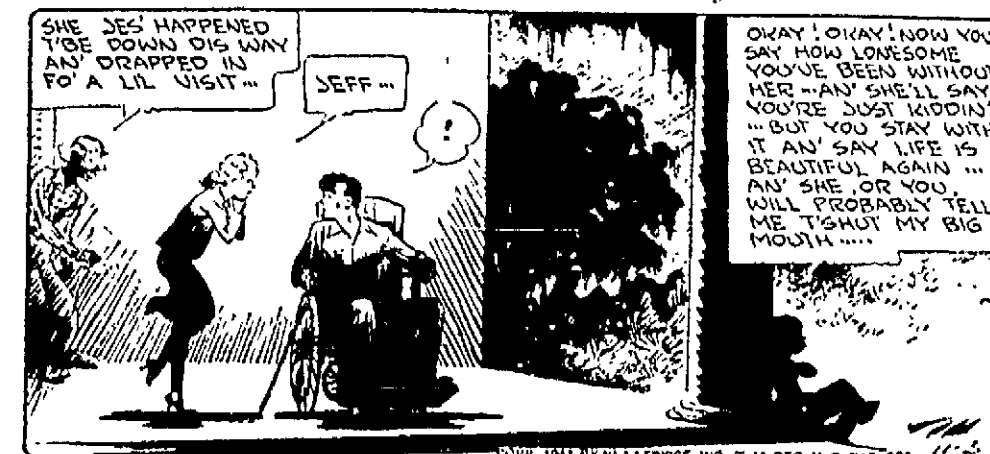

"Hold Back the Dawn" brings to the screen one of the most unusual stories in many a moon. Boyer, a cynical, unscrupulous, handsome heel, is a European emigre with a talent for fleecing wealthy women, an art that won him an easy living in the gay places of France and Italy before the war ended the gigolo industry. Now, stuck for an indefinite period in a sleepy Mexican border town, he has to meet, woo and wed an American girl in order to get into the United States.

Using all the subtleties known only to great lovers, including come-hither eyes, his deep voice and a borrowed wedding ring, Boyer manages to find and trap his victim between dusk and dawn. Then complications set in, leading to a thundering climax and a final happy ending.

Miss de Havilland plays the little school teacher from Azusa, California, who falls for Boyer's suave blandishments and continental charm. Paulette Goddard,

radiant and turbulent, is the feminine menace, a lady from Boyer's past who jealously throws monkey wrenches when real love dawns between the teacher and the scoundrel.

The notable cast of supporting players includes Walter Abel, who plays an immigration inspector; Victor Franzen, Curt Bois, Eric Felday, Nestor Paiva, Eva Puig, Micheline Chierel, Madeline LeGau, Mikhail Rasumny and Billy Lee.

There is only one way to explain Robert Benchley. It takes all kinds of people to make a world. He is an actor. He is an author. He is a columnist, critic, radio commentator, raconteur par excellence. He could be a lot of other things if he were twins, and above all he is Benchley, a good-natured, roly-poly individual with crinkling eyes and booming laugh who sometimes suggests an elf at large, a fat and happy elf, but bewildered.

As pointed out, Benchley is all of those occupations, not one who detoured thru a lot of jobs on the way to the one he holds now. But it's been bothering him, and recently he made up his mind. "Put me down as an actor," he said while playing with Fred Astaire and Rita Hayworth in "You'll Never Get Rich," timely and lavish musical starring the two dancers at the Quilna theatre. "From now on I am going to try to cut out everything but screen work, and limit that to acting."

Like any other curiosity, Robert Benchley had a beginning, and it was at Worcester, Mass. The boy went to local schools graduated from Harvard in 1912, then cut his first occupational notch. Benchley's initial job was in the advertising department of the Curtis Publishing Co., Philadelphia. He lasted two years. For a year he was in the personnel department of a Boston department store. Then the itch to write, first felt in college days, came back.

The tests were given by Dr. H. E. Gibson, assisted by Miss Ruth Lunny, Kenton city health commissioner. Mrs. Orin Hogan is the health chairman of the local P.T.A. The reading of the tests will be made next Tuesday when pupils in need of it will be immunized.

Initial planting for a memorial to the World War dead will be made on the afternoon of Armistice day when legionnaires and members of other patriotic organizations place trees along State Route 25, the Dixie-by, at its northern entrance to Lima.

In co-operation with the State Highway department, the patriotic organizations will plant some dozen trees. The planting will be marked by an appropriate plaque. Additional tree plantings will be held each Armistice day until the Dixie highway is lined with oak trees for several miles.

William Paul Gallagher American Legion post called upon its auxiliary and the Eight and Forty society, and auxiliary, to join in dedicating four trees. The Veterans of Foreign Wars and auxiliary organizations will participate, as will several other patriotic societies. The hour for the ceremonies will be announced in time for the public to attend, according to Post Commander Harry Weldgen of the Legion.
