Memory Lapses
Bessie Feagin, sales promotion manager of the publication, testi-fied Thursday about the mailing list after nearly 24 hours of delay and two court appearances occa-sioned by her "poor memory" which Maloney said, was brought on by conferences by Stewart and Eggleston.
Miss Feagin had been hailed

before District Court Judge James W. Morris for possible contempt action because of the mental "lapse" but her trial was con-tinued to permit her to obtain counsel.

Thursday morning she reap-peared, accompanied by Atty. Nicholas J. Chiascione who explained that he had advised Miss Feagin of the laws of perjury and laws relating to testimony before a grand jury, then announced that he was withdrawing from the case. Can't Get Lawyer

Miss Feagin asked a further de-lay "to see another lawyer" and was given until 2 p. m. to do so. When that deadline arrived, she told Judge Morris that she was unable to find one" and went again before the grand jury. According to a transcript of her
