Michigan Doped To Win

BUCKS DRILL OVERTIME ON AERIAL GAME

Ailing Graf Needed For Punting; New Ohio Offensive Predicted

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Nov. 22.—(AP)—The Ohio State university Buckeyes and Michigan Wolverines clashed here today in their annual football classic before a sell-out crowd of more than 85,000 fans, probably the nation's largest grid gathering of the day.

Captain Fritz Crisler's Michigan-ers were rated 10-7 favorites, but experts agreed that the outcome of the contest depended as much on spirit as on team strength and conceded the Ohioans a good chance to cop the 35th battle between the two schools.

The struggle will determine second place honors in the Western Conference, or, if Minnesota should lose to Wisconsin, will give the winner a share of the championship.

The fact that the odds were against the Bucks made little difference to Coach Paul E. Brown, who foretook the high school coaching ranks this year to take over the Ohio State eleven and lead it to six victories in seven starts.

"We like to go into a game as the underdog," said Brown, "and we're sure ready for this one."

Just what he meant by that, the Buck coach didn't say, but reports from Ohio the past week indicated that the former Massillon high school mentor was prepared to spring an entirely new offensive against the Wolverines if necessary.

Brown admitted that Michigan's forward wall was superior to Ohio's "man-for-man," but word from Ohio's capital indicated the Bucks weren't figuring too hard on trying to piece that stubborn Michigan line.

All week long the Bucks have drilled overtime on passes, and Brown, himself, indicated that his club had been "under wraps" most of the season.

"We've been pointing for this one," he said.

Brown's only worry seemed to be Jack Graf, key offensive cog, who still was limping on an injured knee in yesterday's final workouts. "We figured on Graf to handle the punting, but he'll start whether he can kick or not," Brown asserted.

Graf's loss as a punter would handicap the Bucks defensively, but the return of Lin Houston, sensational sophomore guard who was missed the last two games because of injuries, was expected to offset this advantage.

Michigan, on the other hand, was in top shape physically, and Coach Crisler was confident that his club, which lost only to Minnesota in seven previous games, could handle the Bucks.

At least one-fifth of today's crowd—some 17,000—were fans from the Buckeye state and Ann Arbor police recruited officers from neighboring cities to handle the overflow thousands.

The weather bureau promised ideal weather at kickoff time (2 p. m., E. S. T.), with the mercury hovering between 30 and 40 degrees and "a few flakes of snow."

Gophers Favored Over Wisconsin MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 22.—(INS)—Minnesota's mighty Gophers, unbeaten in seven starts this season and riding the crest of a 16-game victory wave, were heavy favorites over Wisconsin's Badgers today as the ancient rivals tangled before a crowd of more than 50,000.

The Gophers needed only to get by the Badgers to complete their second straight perfect season and grab their second straight undisputed Big Ten championship.

Wisconsin fans regarded the contest as anything but a push-over for the Gophers despite the betting odds, for the Badgers have proved themselves the most prolific scoring team in the Big Ten.

IRISH, DUKE AND GOPHERS RECEIVE NOD

Reckless Opponents Stand In Path Of Three Undeclared Slates

NEW YORK, Nov. 22.—(AP)—It's the end of the glory road today for a majority of the collegiate football teams and nowhere will the sunset be more welcome than at Duke, Notre Dame and Minnesota, where unbeaten elevens prevailed at dawn.

Each club is playing its last scheduled game against a reckless rival, Duke meeting North Carolina, Notre Dame host to Southern California, and Minnesota seeking its 17th straight from point-crazy Wisconsin.

All three of the unbeaten elevens are favored but the Irish still remember 1938 when they entered the Trojan fray without a blemish and were blanketed. Upsets have not been as recent in the other two rivalries.

The day also provides the Harvard-Yale perennial. Bob Zuppke's final appearance as the Illinois coach in the meeting with Northwestern. St. Mary's intercollegiate clash with Fordham, Alabama vs. Vanderbilt and the Cornell meeting with Pennsylvania, where a sellout throng of 74,000 is expected.

The southwest has two top-ranking affairs, Texas Christian hoping to increase its title chances by whipping Rice and Baylor tangling with Southern Methodist, Arkansas, also of the southwest circuit, visits Mississippi.

Purdue's spat with Indiana for the old Oaken Buckel and Iowa's invasion of Nebraska in the corn-belt classic are midwest contests that refused to be submerged by the Notre Dame-Trojan or Illinois-Northwestern games and by Ohio State's invasion of Michigan.

Missouri would clinch the Big Six title by subduing Kansas. Washington, still retaining Rose bowl hopes, opposes Oregon, and Oregon State hopes to smack over Montana in such fashion that the Pasadena nod will come to it.

Next to the Duke finale, the Alabama-Vanderbilt tussle holds the attention of the south.

Navy goes against an upcoming Princeton tiger in the east, and Army meets the equally improving West Virginia Mountaineers as a prelude to the service clash next week. Pitt hopes to make it three in a row, with Penn State the victim, the Panthers buoyed by knowing that the invaders haven't won in the Smoky City since 1919.

Dartmouth Plays Georgia At Athens

ATHENS, Ga., Nov. 22.—(INS)—University of Georgia's Bulldogs met Dartmouth's invading Indians in a homecoming intercollegiate gridiron battle this afternoon—outcome of which may decide whether or not the Athens orange has a reserve ticket on the Olympic bowl speed for the annual New Year's day classic.

A sell-out crowd of 20,000 fans were on hand to see the indomitable Frankie (Broken Jawed) Sinkwich lead his Georgia team against Coach Tuss Meagher's boys from the Yankee hinterland.

Georgia, with only one defeat and one tie against its record for the season, was ruled slight favorite.

SNAVELY APPOINTED ITHACA, N. Y., Nov. 22.—(INS)—Carl Snavely today looked forward to his seventh season as head coach of Cornell's football team. University authorities last night announced that Snavely would continue in his post during 1942.
