

Fibber Mc'Gee And Molly To Head Cast Of Sigma Movie

"Look Who's Laughing" Will Open On Saturday; Fonda And Stanwyck Together In The Quilna's "You Belong To Me"

The pride of Wistful Vista, Fibber McGee and Molly, appear in the new film coming Saturday at the Sigma theatre, "Look Who's Laughing." Others appearing in the first starring adventure of the famous homespun pair are Charlie McCarthy, Edgar Bergen and Lucille Ball, with Gildersleeve, Mrs. Uppington and the Old Timer aiding in the fun.

Henry Fonda and Barbara Stanwyck are the stars of the new Quilna film, "You Belong To Me," comedy farce of the married life of a serious woman of the world and a socialite husband.

What happens when a famous radio star, flying away on a vacation trip to avoid business worries, accidentally becomes involved in the more colossal business woes of a small town couple, makes hilarious complications in "Look Who's Laughing."

Edgar Bergen, Charlie McCarthy, Fibber McGee and Molly, as themselves, and Lucille Ball, are co-starring in this bright comedy feature which is laid in Wistful Vista of radio fame.

When Bergen, as a popular ventriloquist on the radio, and Charlie his little wooden protegee, are flying over Wistful Vista enroute to a vacation resort following their last broadcast of the season, they are forced to make an emergency landing on the village's unkempt aviation field. Taken into the home of McGee, the head of the local Chamber of Commerce, Bergen soon learns that the zealous citizen has involved himself in a serious situation thru his efforts to get an airplane factory located.

The crooked men opposing his plan, however, are eventually confounded when Bergen and his pretty secretary, Lucille Ball, personally take charge of things and bring about the success of McGee's devoted mission.

Said to be crammed from beginning to end with uproarious comedy, "Look Who's Laughing" was directed and produced by Allan Dwan, while the supporting cast includes such popular radio characters as Gildersleeve, Mrs. Uppington and Old Timer.

Entertainment in every sense of the word is what Ohio theatre patrons will find today when they see "One Foot in Heaven." It tells the story of a parson and his typical American family. Typical, in that they laugh at the same things, share the same joys and sorrows, and have the same problems as any family, anywhere in the United States. It is a quaint, nostalgic tale containing much warmer humor, with the average Midwestern small town for its background. It opens in those gay days just after the turn of the century and continues thru the riotous days after the Armistice of World War I.

"One Foot in Heaven" has a grand cast featuring Fredric March and Martha Scott in the starring roles with Beulah Bondi, Gene Lockhart, Elizabeth Fraser, Harry Davenport, Laura Hope Crews, Moroni Olsen, Frankie Thomas and a host of the other fine players in the supporting parts.

Fredric March, always one of the best of the screen's dramatic actors, plays the role of Father, a benevolent tyrant whose outward discipline and inward sympathy makes him one of the screen's most lovable characters. His constant struggle to keep both his family and his congregation in line proves a life-time task that is fraught with heartaches and happiness. Martha Scott, famous for her stage and screen performances in "Our Town," is cast as the parson's wife, a role for which she is perfectly suited. Martha's continual problem is that of trying to strike a happy medium between Father's discipline and the children's human inclination to cut up once in a while and forget that their father is a minister, and that they are supposed to provide an example of good conduct to the other children.

Barbara Stanwyck and Henry Fonda, the lovable "Lady Eve" combination are again teamed in "You Belong To Me," which is at the Quilna theatre. A Wesley Ruggles' production, and based upon a screen play by Claude Binnon, "You Belong To Me" includes Edgar Buchanan, Roger Clark, Ruth Donnelly and Melville Cooper in its featured supporting cast.

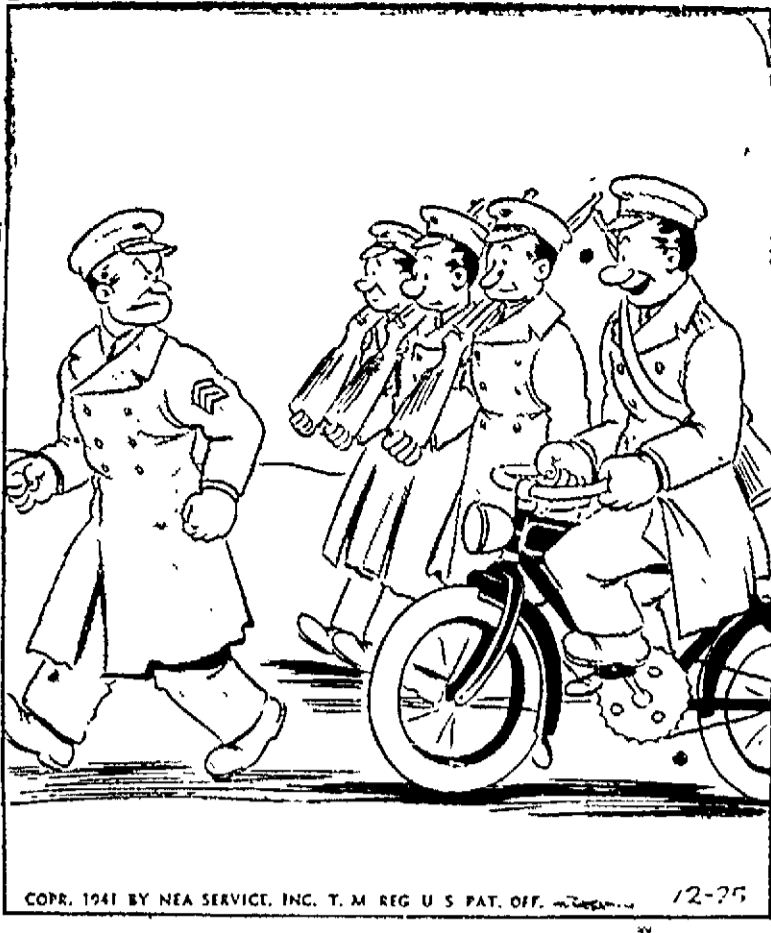
